#### **FINANCE COMMITTEE**

The following conditions are attached to and made a part of this grant award:

- 1. Where the Statement of Grant Award reflects a required match contribution by the grant recipient, the recipient agrees, by accepting the award, to provide the match as shown in non-federal match.
- 2. By signing the Statement of Grant Award/Acceptance, the grant recipient agrees:
  - to use the grant funds to carry out the activities described in the grant application, as modified by the terms and conditions attached to this award or by subsequent amendments approved by DCJS;
  - to adhere to the approved budget contained in this award and amendments made to it in accord with these terms and conditions;
  - and to comply with all terms, conditions and assurances either attached to this award or submitted with the grant application.
- 3. By accepting this grant, the recipient assures that funds made available through it will not be used to replace state or local funds that would, in the absence of this grant, be made available for the same purposes.
- 4. Within 60 days of the starting date of the grant, the subgrantee must initiate the project funded. If not, the subgrantee must report to the DCJS, by letter, the steps taken to initiate the project, the reasons for the delay, and the expected starting date. If the project is not operational within 90 days of the start date, the subgrantee must obtain approval in writing from the DCJS for a new implementation date or the DCJS may cancel and terminate the project and redistribute the funds.
- 5. The subgrantee agrees to submit such reports as requested by DCJS on forms provided by DCJS. Funds from this grant will not be disbursed, if any of the required Financial or Progress reports are overdue by more than 30 days unless you can show good cause for missing the reporting deadline.
- 6. Grant funds are usually disbursed quarterly. Grant state and local match funds are expended and/or obligated during the grant period. All legal obligations must be liquidated no later than 90 days after the end of the grant period. All requests for reimbursement must be completed within 90 days after the end of the grant. The grant recipient agrees to submit to the DCJS a final grant financial report and return all unexpended grant funds that were received within 90-days after the end of the grant.
- 7. Budget Amendment Requests must be submitted through GMIS by the Project Director, Program Administrator, or Finance Officer. This Budget Amendment form must be accompanied with a narrative. No more than two such amendments will be permitted during the grant period. The deadline for all budget amendments to be submitted will be 45 days prior to the end of the grant year.
- 8. Acceptance of this grant award by the local government applicant constitutes its agreement that it assumes full responsibility for the management of all aspects of the grant and the activities funded by the grant, including assuring proper fiscal management of and accounting for grant funds; assuring that personnel paid with grant funds are hired, supervised and evaluated in accord with the local government's established employment and personnel policies; and assuring that all terms, conditions and assurances—those submitted with the grant application, and those issued with this award—are complied with.

- a. By signing the Statement of Grant Award/Acceptance, the grantee agrees to comply with all terms, conditions, certifications and assurances that are attached to and made part of this grant award.

- 9. Any delegation of responsibility for carrying out grant-funded activities to an office or department not a part of the local government must be pursuant to a written memorandum of understanding by which the implementing office or department agrees to comply with all applicable grant terms, conditions and assurances. Any such delegation notwithstanding, the applicant acknowledges by its acceptance of the award its ultimate responsibility for compliance with all terms, conditions and assurances of the grant award.
- 10. The grantee agrees to comply with the Virginia Public Procurement Act <a href="http://eva.virginia.gov/pages/eva-vppa.htm">http://eva.virginia.gov/pages/eva-vppa.htm</a>. Procurement transactions, whether negotiated or advertised and without regard to dollar value, shall be conducted in a manner so as to provide maximum open and free competition.   - Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972, which prohibits discrimination on the basis of sex in education programs and activities (20 U.S.C. § 1681), and the DOJ implementing regulations at 28 C.F.R. Part 54;
  - The Age Discrimination Act of 1975, which prohibits discrimination on the basis of age in the delivery of services (42 U.S.C. § 6102), and the DOJ implementing regulations at 28 C.F.R. Part 42, Subpart I; and
  - The DOJ regulations on the Equal Treatment for Faith-Based Organizations, which prohibit discrimination on the basis of religion in the delivery of services and prohibit organizations from using DOJ funding for inherently religious activities (28 C.F.R. Part 38).
  - The Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention Act of 1974, as amended, which prohibits discrimination in both employment and the delivery of services or benefits based on race, color, national origin, religion, and sex in JJDPA-funded programs or activities (42 U.S.C. § 5672(b)).

# Project Narrative Frederick County Sheriff's Office Reaching out to Citizens in Frederick County

#### **Need Statement**

The Frederick County Sheriff's Office is the full service law enforcement agency for Frederick County, Virginia. Frederick County's population is approximately 83,000 people according to the 2015 census estimate. Frederick County is 415 square miles of suburban, rural, commercial, and agricultural developments, which surrounds Winchester City, the county seat. There are two incorporated towns in Frederick County, Stephens City and Middletown. Four major highways including Interstate 81 pass through Frederick County. The Frederick County Sheriff's Office responded to over 67,000 calls for service in 2015.

Frederick County like other localities has struggled with balancing its budget and still meeting the needs of the citizens. One of the unmet needs is providing more community interaction with the citizens of Frederick County via crime prevention presentations and brochures. Like other localities throughout the state and country, Frederick County is struggling to allocate needed resources because of the drug abuse (heroin) issue. The following populations need more crime prevention attention in Frederick County. The Latino community, the high school community, and the senior citizen community currently do not receive the needed attention to address their needs.

The Sheriff's Office currently attends community events throughout the county. A need that has been determined is for the proper equipment to attend these functions. The Sheriff's Office needs new tables and chairs to take to the functions and would like to have a nice pop up tent with our logo on the tent. The tent would help identify the Frederick County Sheriff's Office as being a participant in the function. Currently we do not have a way to identify the Sheriff's Office as a participant.

The Latino population is increasing in Frederick County, but it is an underserved population. Frederick County Sheriff's Office has not had the funds to do outreach programs in the Latino community. The Sheriff's Office would like to be able to reach out to this underserved community and offer them the same crime prevention information we offer to the English speaking population. This would be the foundation to establish a trusting relationship between the Latino community and the Sheriff's Office.

The Frederick County Sheriff's Office currently has School Resource Officers in 3 high schools and 4 middle schools in Frederick County. We also have a D.A.R.E. officer that teaches the program in the 11 elementary schools. The School Resource Officers teach Virginia rules in the high schools; however, we do not have any brochures to hand out to the students. Another issue is the amount of mental health issues that have been reported to School Resource Officers. Frederick County Public Schools averages 4 deaths per year from suicide and traffic accidents. The Sheriff's Office would like to provide information to students on current crimes, mental health, and driving safely.

Another community service the Frederick County Sheriff's Office provides is sponsoring an Explorer Program. This program allows young people between the ages of 14 and 21 to explore a career in law enforcement. They meet twice a month and do training similar to the basic law enforcement academy. The requested funding for this program will allow the Sheriff's Office to purchase new uniforms for the Explorers, which will help identify them when they are doing community events for the Sheriff's Office. This exposure helps recruit other Explorers and their interaction with other people their age creates a positive perception of the Sheriff's Office.

The senior population is also growing in Frederick County. We have two large senior residential communities in Frederick County that accept residents continually. There are also numerous senior

residents who live alone in the county in their own residence. Additionally, law enforcement agencies in Virginia have been tasked with search and rescue. The Sheriff's Office has seen an increase in calls for search and rescue resources, including missing senior citizens. Frederick County Sheriff's Office currently has Project Lifesaver, but we do not have enough band kits to meet the demand, especially for lower income seniors and families with autistic children.

Everyone knows that equipment can malfunction or fail at the most inopportune time. Two receivers are the minimum needed to do a good search for a missing person with a Project Lifesaver transmitter. Three receivers would ensure that at least two are working or three would allow more territory to be covered locating the missing person faster. This is always crucial in inclement weather when location time could mean life or death to the missing child or senior citizen.

In January 2016 the Sheriff's Office started our own program to assist senior citizens in Frederick County with quality of life issues, including crime prevention. We have put on several seminars on scams, senior abuse, and medical awareness. These seminars have been attended consistently by approximately 30 senior citizens. The Sheriff's Office also participates in the Triad/Salt program where we also reach out to senior citizens within the Frederick County/Clarke County/Winchester City community. We also provide speakers and brochures for these events.

Another issue that the Sheriff's Office has experience is gaining entry into senior citizens residence to check their welfare. We received 709 "Check the Welfare" calls for service in 2015. Approximately half of these calls were for senior citizens. On most of these calls the deputies have difficulty gaining entrance into the residence to check on the resident. Numerous times deputies will have to force entry into the residence to check on the person because they live alone. Providing lockboxes to the senior citizens who live alone and cannot afford one will help us better serve this segment of our population.

The Frederick County Sheriff's Office has the I2 program, but does not have a trained analyst to operate this program. The I2 program is a program that allows the operator to track different types of crimes or events. This would be useful in determining the correct response to criminal incidents, arrest data, traffic stops, or use of force issues.

In conclusion, the Frederick County Sheriff's Office believes there is a need to provide additional services to the underserved Latino community, the high school community and the senior citizen community in Frederick County. The funds from this grant would be used to further educate and assist these underserved populations while building a trusting relationship.

#### **Project Description**

#### Latino Community Outreach

The Sheriff's Office will purchase the brochures written in Spanish and actively seek times to interact with the Latino community. We do have several areas in the county where there is a high concentration of Latinos residing. We plan to do some community events in those areas. The tables, chairs, and tent would be used to set up an area where we could distribute the brochures and interact with the community. We believe that reaching out to the Latino community will facilitate the development of a trusting relationship that will encourage the community to engage in crime prevention within their community. The I2 program would be used to provide relevant information to the Latino community about crime trends and other issues.

#### High School Community Outreach

The Sheriff's Office would like to provide information to students on current crimes, mental health, and safe driving. The brochures would be distributed to students at schools throughout the county to reinforce what they were taught by the School Resource Officers. The brochures would be given out in the spring and fall of 2017 to the students. The brochures would not be given to the same class both

times so as to reach more students.

The uniforms for the Explorers would be purchased and issued to them immediately. Most of our Explorers are high school students and interact with other students daily. We would also allow them to speak at community events about our program.

#### Senior Citizen Community Outreach

The Frederick County Sheriff's Office will purchase brochures and medical information cards and distribute them at community function, seminars, and events as soon as they are received. They will also be distributed at the two annual Triad/Salt events.

The lockboxes will also be installed at residences where a need to have one has been identified. This will immediately allow access to senior citizen residences where the senior live alone. This will help alleviate one of the biggest concerns voiced by senior citizens living alone; no one will be able to get into their residence to help them in a time of need.

The Project Lifesaver receiver and transmitters will be ordered and the transmitters will be allocated as needed to people who suffer from Alzheimer's and Autism who ae considered fight risks. This equipment is also used in Search and Rescue training were we have a deputy take a transmitter and wander off in the woods or a residential area and the team locates the missing deputy.

#### **Project Timeline**

The Sheriff's Office will begin using the requested funds immediately upon receiving the funds to purchase the requested equipment and supplies. Once the equipment and supplies are purchased then the Sheriff's Office will start attending more community events and will host at least one community event for the Latino community in Frederick County. All funds will be expended by December 31, 2017.

Currently the Sheriff's Office has a monthly seminar for senior citizens on current issues. The purchased brochures would be handed out at these meetings. Also Triad/Salt has a spring and fall event where the brochures could be given out to seniors. The new tables, chairs and tent would be used at all of these functions.

The Sheriff's Office will purchase the lockboxes and identify needy senior citizens that need a lockbox installed on their residence. Once identified the lockbox will be installed and the combination will be placed in our CAD system so that the Sheriff's Office or Fire and Rescue can enter the residence whenever a emergency occurs or the person's welfare needs to be checked.

The School Resource Officers interact with the students daily and participate in teaching and events at their assigned school continuously. Once the brochures are purchased they can be given out during these interactions with the students to supplement the message that was just taught.

There are several I2 training classes scheduled for 2017. The crime analyst would enroll in one of these scheduled classes to receive the training in the use of this program.

- 1. Jared Nail-Explorer Program (\$773.00)

- 3. Greg Lambert-Project Lifesaver. (\$681.00)

These three people already perform duties related to the above mentioned programs and the purchased supplies and equipment will enhance their ability to reach out to more citizens of Frederick County.

#### **Equipment**

Amount Requested: \$9800.00

The equipment will be used as follows:

- The project Lifesaver band kit will allow us to sign up 10 more flight risk individuals to the Project Lifesaver program. (\$3500.00)
- We would like to purchase another PL1-5000 receiver from Project Lifesaver to track missing individuals. We currently have 2 receivers now, but a third one will allow us to cover more area, thus locating the missing person faster. (\$1800.00)
- The exterior lockbox program will allow us to place a spare house key in an exterior lockbox of a senior citizen that resides alone. This will allow the Sheriff's Office and Fire and Rescue to enter the residence in emergency cases without damaging doors or windows to gain entry. (\$2000.00)
- The Explorer program is a visible part of the Sheriff's Office at different events. Purchasing uniforms for the Explorers will promote unity within the program and attract new recruits for the program. The Explorer program provides positive interaction with the Sheriff's Office and young adults. The uniforms would be pants, shirts, belts, and boots. (\$2000.00)
- Purchasing a tent and tables and chairs will allow the Sheriff's Office to provide a better environment when we attend different community functions. The tent will provide protection from the sun and rain. The tables and chairs will allow us more space to do fingerprinting and provide crime prevention literature to the community. (\$500.00)

#### Supplies and Other Expences

Amount Requested: \$8199.00

- Obtain and distribute brochures on Elder Abuse/ Exploitation which will raise awareness of issues and provide local support information. (\$2500.00)
- Refrigerator cards which list crucial medical and emergency information about a resident to receive emergency aid faster from emergency personnel dispatched to the residence. (\$2000.00)
- Promote Law enforcement in the community by purchasing crime prevention brochures written in Spanish for our Latino community and youth oriented brochures to encourage youth to noncriminal behavior. (\$699.00)
- I2 Training. Allow the Sheriff's Office full time crime analyst to attend i2 Information training to assist with tracking all types of incidents occurring throughout the county. (\$1500.00)

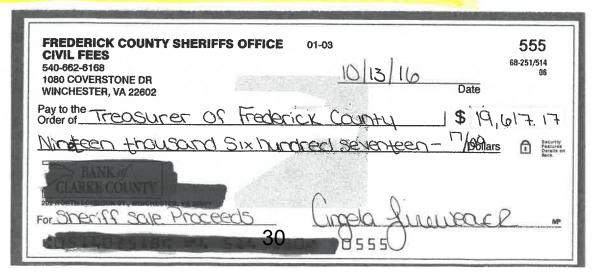

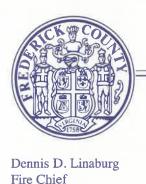

Expenditures increased \$2,742,791.09. **General Administration** increased \$1,277,073.39 and includes the timing of the Comprehensive Services Fund transfer for \$1,263,458 due to projected increase of expenses. Funds were not transferred until January in the previous year. **Public Safety** increased \$705,509.58 and reflects an increase of the local contribution to the Jail of \$98,307. Additionally, the year to date salaries and fringe benefits increased \$633,954.27 impacted by the addition of seven deputy and sixteen firefighter positions. The Transfers decreased \$2,490,018.46.
