FREDERICK COUNTY SHERIFF'S OFFICE

DESCRIPTION:

The Frederick County Sheriff's Office is currently made up of 139 sworn personnel, 4 dispatchers and 10 office/clerical personnel. The office is responsible for the safety and well-being of over 83,000 residents and covers approximately 416 square miles. The Frederick County Sheriff's Office is made up of four divisions.

- The Patrol Division is responsible for answering calls for service, handling criminal complaints, and patrolling the streets and highways of Frederick County promoting highway safety. Our patrol division is broken down into shifts, each shift is responsible for business checks, serving warrants, responding to alarms, handling detention orders, protective orders, preparing cases and presenting evidence in court. The traffic unit handles numerous traffic related issues involving citizen complaints, investigates traffic accident and issues citations when violations are detected. This unit has become a necessity with the growth of Frederick County. Other duties include coordinating special details such as DUI checkpoints, seatbelt safety checkpoints, speed surveys and any other issues that may be driver related. School Resource Officers (S.R.O.'s) and the Animal Control Officers are also included in the Patrol Division.
- Administrative Services Division is responsible for maintaining the Sheriff's Office accreditation, training and provides community services such as neighborhood watch, and project lifesaver. The office recently implemented an elder assist program where the focus is on the needs of the elderly. Whether or not they are invalid or alone, we provide a personal welfare check and also an avenue to inform them of scams and issues that pertain to our elderly population.
- The Criminal Investigative Division handles all major felony cases and more serious misdemeanor crimes cases in addition to special investigations such as drugs, gangs, child pornography, child sexual abuse, child physical abuse, white-collar crime, computer crimes and fraud.
- The Court Security and Civil Process Division is responsible for providing security for the Fredrick County courts. This division is also responsible for serving all civil papers within Frederick County and handling mental transports, TDO's, prisoner extraditions and transports both in and out of the Commonwealth.

Within the Frederick County Sheriff's Office, specialized units have been created to handle incidents such as missing persons, hostage/barricade situations, underwater search and rescue and civil riots or disturbances. These specialized units are comprised of personnel from the Patrol Division, Administrative Division, Criminal Investigative Division and Civil Process Division. The personnel in these units have advanced training beyond the mandatory requirements.

*Continue to provide the Citizens of Frederick County the best services possible by providing community relations through deputies performing a variety of duties, to include Sheriff's Kid Camp, the D.A.R.E program, Neighborhood Watch Meetings, Project Lifesaver, VIN Etching, Elder Assistance Programs and Child Fingerprinting.

*Continue to upgrade law enforcement equipment by adding to the more modern equipment such as TASERS, Less than Lethal Weapons and other alternatives to deadly force while keeping the safety of our personnel and the public as our #1 priority.

*Continue OUR working relationships with outside agencies that request our services.

*Continue efforts to recruit and hire quality personnel.

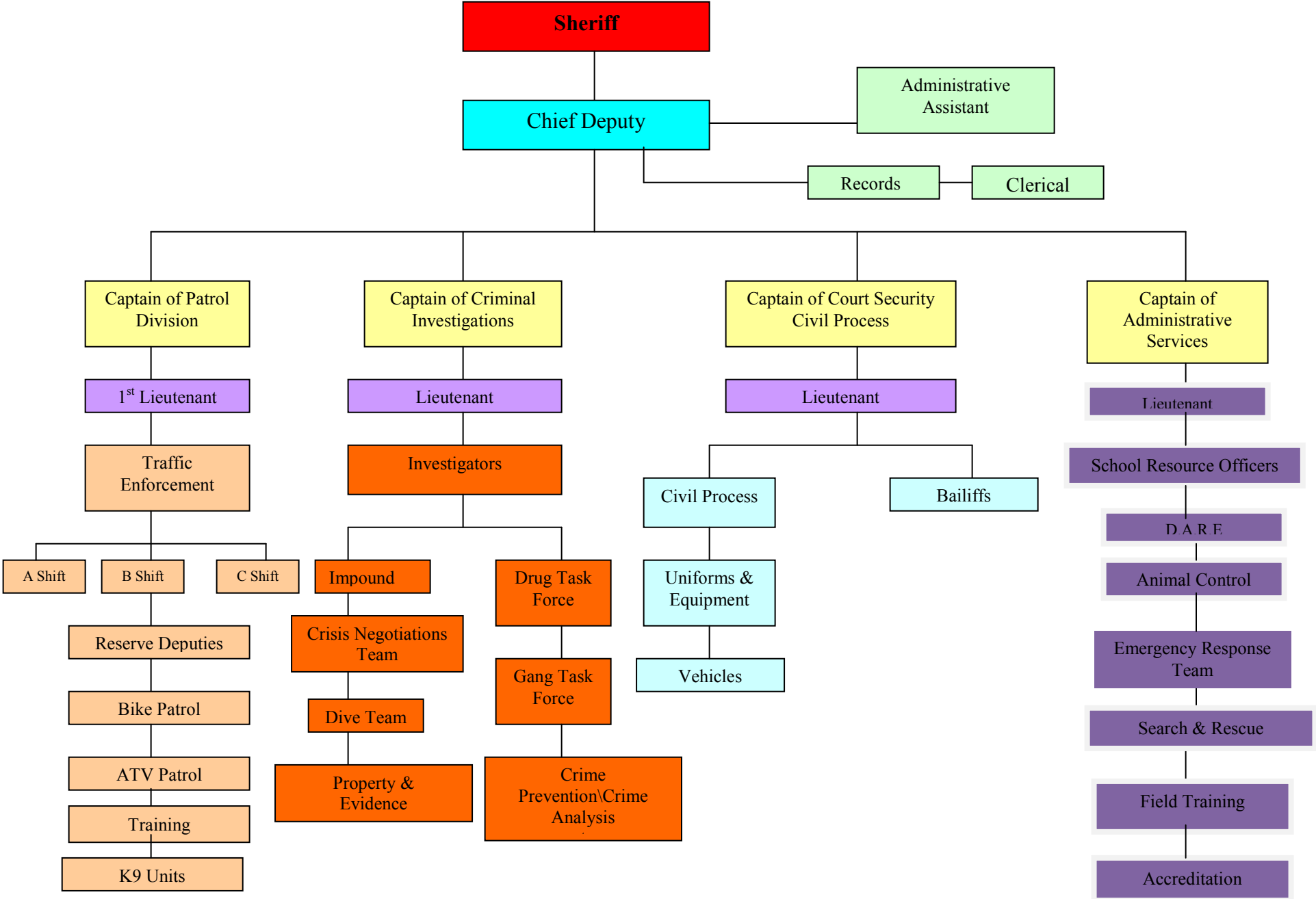
*Continue to maintain the Virginia Law Enforcement Accreditation Standards, which we recently obtained for another 4 years.

The **Patrol Division** is the most noticeable Division of the Frederick County Sheriff's Office. The Patrol Division is responsible for responding to calls for service received through the Frederick County Emergency Communications Center. The Patrol Division has three shifts that provide 24/7 law enforcement coverage for Frederick County. Other units of the Patrol Division are the K-9 deputies, the Traffic Enforcement Unit, and the Bicycle Patrol.

The **Criminal Investigation Division (CID)** is responsible for investigating all major crimes that occur in Frederick County. Investigators in the Division may specialize in certain fields of investigation, i.e., property crimes, crimes against persons, etc. Investigators from this division also participate in regional task forces. These task forces include the Regional Drug Task Force, the Regional Gang Task Force, the FBI Violent Crimes Task Force, and the Internet Crimes Against Children (ICAC) Task Force. The Hostage Negotiation Team, the Underwater Search and Recovery Team, and Evidence and Property are also part of the Criminal Investigation Division.

High Profile Cases

Homicide – Heflin

On December 12, 2016 deputies with the Frederick County Sheriff's Office responded to the 200 block of Stafford Drive after the Frederick County Emergency dispatch received a 911 call from a male stating that he had just shot his wife in the head. As deputies arrived on scene, a male stepped outside and surrendered himself to law enforcement without further incident. The male was identified as Thomas Heflin, 56 of Winchester, Virginia, and he was also determined to be the 911 caller. During the course of the investigation, it was determined as a result of a domestic situation, Thomas Heflin's wife, Jeanette Heflin, 54 had received a single gunshot wound to the left arm, and head area and was transported to the Winchester Medical Center and then airlifted to Inova Hospital in Fairfax, Virginia for further treatment where she remains in critical condition at the time of this release. The weapon that is believed to have been used and was recovered from the scene was a 12 gauge shotgun. As a result of the investigation, Thomas Heflin has been charged with Attempted Murder and Use of Firearm in Commission of a Felony.

Homicide – Sinclair

Police arrested Frances Charlene Moss-Hopkins, 55, of 2061 Withers Larue Road, and charged her with felony first-degree murder late Tuesday. Her arrest followed days of searching for 85-year-old Peggy "Peg" Sinclair, who was reported missing on Saturday from her home at 223 Glebe Drive near Lake Frederick in Frederick County.

Law enforcement discovered partially decomposed human remains off Scotty's Gully Road near U.S. Route 50 just east of Romney on Tuesday. The West Virginia State Medical Examiner's Office will be confirming the victim's identity and cause of death, but the Frederick County Sheriff's Office announced Tuesday that the body found was that of Sinclair.

A criminal complaint attached to Moss-Hopkins' court documents notes that she directed investigators to the area in Romney where the remains were discovered. The complaint states that Moss-Hopkins "explained that the condition of the body would be horrible."

Capt. Donnie Lang of the Frederick County Sheriff's Office said Moss-Hopkins had been a home caregiver to Sinclair for about a year. He said that Moss-Hopkins, who was not employed by a business, would perform household tasks like cleaning. She was paid for her work, but Lang would not comment on the amount or frequency of those payments and said she had no other job that he knew of.

He said investigators are still looking into possible motives. "We're really starting to investigate the overall thing that has led to this, and the motive to this, and anybody else could potentially be convicted," he said. "We will continue to investigate the scene ... to either confirm or eliminate other people's involvement."

Armed Robbery

On August 5, 2016 at approximately 1:30 AM deputies were dispatched to the 7-11 located at 1001 Aylor Rd for a report of an armed robbery. The clerk working at the time of the robbery reported that the suspect displayed a hatchet/tomahawk, and demanded money. The clerk complied with the suspect's demands and was unharmed. The suspect left with an undetermined amount of cash. While investigating the robbery, Martins Food Store, located at 240 Elizabeth Dr. contacted the Sheriff's Office in reference to a suspicious person. Deputies responded and spoke with the individual. During the conversation it was determined that he was the suspect in the 7-11 armed robbery, and suspected of stealing a vehicle from a residence in the 200-block of Frederick Town Dr, which was later found in the 100-block of Halifax Crt. Subject was arrested, he has been charged with Robbery and Grand Larceny, and is currently incarcerated at the jail. The subject has been identified as Micah John Macbeth, 19 YOA, of Warrenton, VA

Fairground Equipment Malfunction

On July 25, 2016 shortly after 7:00 PM, the Frederick County Fire and Rescue, along with the Sheriff's Office responded to a 47 year old female injured while riding a ride called the Super Shot at the Frederick County Fairgrounds. While the ride was descending, the seat the female was secured in,

came detached from the main frame of the ride, and struck the ground. It is estimated that the fall was approximately 40 feet. The female rider sustained multiple injuries and was transported to the Winchester Medical Center for treatment. The cause of the accident was deemed to be bolts which were not attached correctly. The lead investigating agency of this incident is the Frederick County Building Inspections Department.

2016 A Year of Thanks

This year had been a rough year for law enforcement. Several countrywide anti-law enforcement protests were held, which turned into violence and outrage. Many officers were target for fatal attacks throughout the year. The Frederick County residents went out of their way to show how much they appreciated. 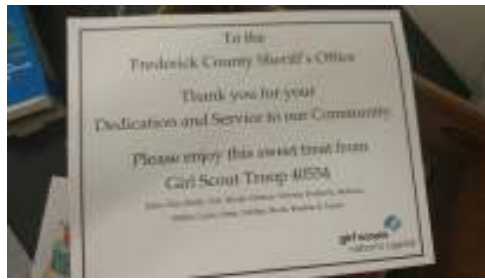

NALOXONE



The Frederick County Sheriff's Office received grant money which allowed for the purchase of Naloxone. Naloxone cartridges are filled with drugs that are injected into the outer thigh. Once the drug is administered, it relieves opiate overdose symptoms for 30 to 45 minutes.

In 2016 there were 37 saves from deputies administering Naloxone.

K 9



The department received a new K9 in 2016.

Bleu is a Bloodhound. Bleu is trained to be given an individual's scent whether a criminal suspect who has fled a scene, or to a missing person who has not been found, and be able to follow that scent and identify that individual. Bleu can follow that scent inside buildings, through the woods, through water and such obstacles he may encounter.

New Operations

CRT – Community Response Team

The Sheriff's Office created a Community Response Team to work outside of the patrol shifts to better meet the needs of the Sheriff's Office. The team works closely with Probation and Parole and the Northwestern Regional Drug Task Force in the community to reduce crime and ensure everyone's safety.

FREDERICK TRACKING PROGRAM TO HELP SAVE LIVES

WINCHESTER — The Frederick County Sheriff's Office received a \$15,000 grant from the U.S. Department of Justice and the Alzheimer's Association to help bring Project Lifesaver to the county.

Project Lifesaver is an international nonprofit organization that employs tracking technology to search for and rescue individuals with cognitive disorders. The program is primarily aimed to benefit adults and children who wander off because of Alzheimer's, autism and other conditions.

Sheriff Lenny Millholland used the program during his time as Winchester's sheriff, but this is the first time it is being used in the county. Former city police Chief Col. Gary Reynolds, a staff instructor for Project Lifesaver, helped train deputies Tuesday on using the tracking equipment. The grant covered the expenses of two radio transmitters, two receivers, the training of eight personnel, batteries and antennas. The tamper-proof transmitters, which cost about \$350 each, are usually worn on wrist straps.

"Most of the people [wearing them] are either autistic children or elderly that have no concept that it is on," Millholland said. The transmitters can also be placed on a person's legs or tied into a child's shoelaces. If an individual wearing the transmitter goes missing and the Sheriff's Office is alerted, deputies will search for the frequency on a receiver to track the person's location; each transmitter has its own frequency and identification number. When the deputies dial in the frequency assigned to the missing person, the only frequency that will show up is the one for that individual.

In addition to the two transmitters paid for by the grant, Project Lifesaver has provided seven Frederick County residents with transmitters. Reynolds said significant training time was spent discussing strategies to deal with children with special needs, as well as older individuals who may have dementia or Alzheimer's. "One of the big issues with some of the younger people is they have no sense of consequence," Reynolds said. "So running out in to traffic means nothing to them."

According to Millholland, in Project Lifesaver's 17 years of operation, it has a 100 percent success rate, with an average response time of 30 minutes nationwide. The program is used by more than 2,000 law enforcement agencies in the U.S. The eight deputies being trained are expected to become certified as electronic-search specialists and certified instructors of the program today. They will be able to train the remainder of the Sheriff's Office staff.

DEFINITIONS USED FOR STATISTIC COUNTS

Property Crimes

In the Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) Program, property crime includes the offenses of burglary, larceny-theft, motor vehicle theft, and arson. The object of the theft-type offenses is the taking of money or property, but there is no force or threat of force against the victims. The property crime category includes arson because the offense involves the destruction of property; however, arson victims may be subjected to force.

Sex offenses

Offenses against chastity, common decency, morals, and the like. Incest, indecent exposure, and statutory rape are included. Attempts, battery and child sex crimes are included.

Forcible rape

The carnal knowledge of a female forcibly and against her will. Rapes by force and attempts or assaults to rape, regardless of the age of the victim, are included. Statutory offenses (no force used—victim under age of consent) are excluded.

Violent Crimes

Violent crime is composed of four offenses: murder and nonnegligent manslaughter, forcible rape, robbery, and aggravated assault. According to the Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) Program's definition, violent crimes involve force or threat of force.

Drug Abuse Violations

The violation of laws prohibiting the production, distribution, and/or use of certain controlled substances. The unlawful cultivation, manufacture, distribution, sale, purchase, use, possession, transportation, or importation of any controlled drug or narcotic substance. Driving under the influence Driving or operating a motor vehicle or common carrier while mentally or physically impaired as the result of consuming an alcoholic beverage or using a drug or narcotic.

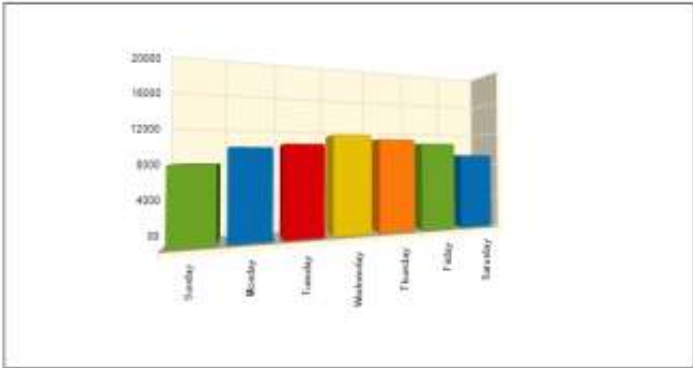
Liquor laws The violation of state or local laws or ordinances prohibiting the manufacture, sale, purchase, transportation, possession, or use of alcoholic beverages, not including driving under the influence and drunkenness. Federal violations are excluded.

Drunkenness To drink alcoholic beverages to the extent that one's mental faculties and physical coordination are substantially impaired. Driving under the influence is excluded.

 for 2016

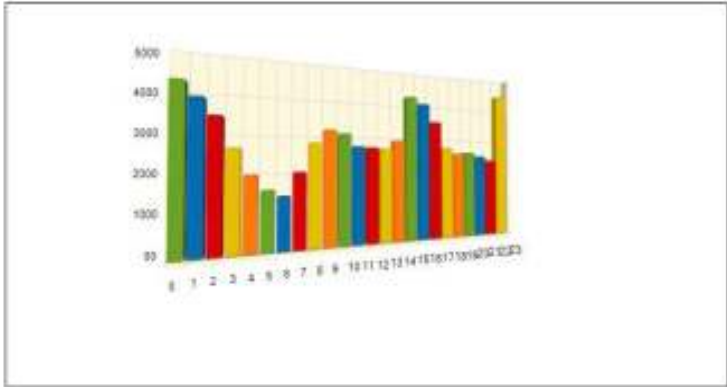

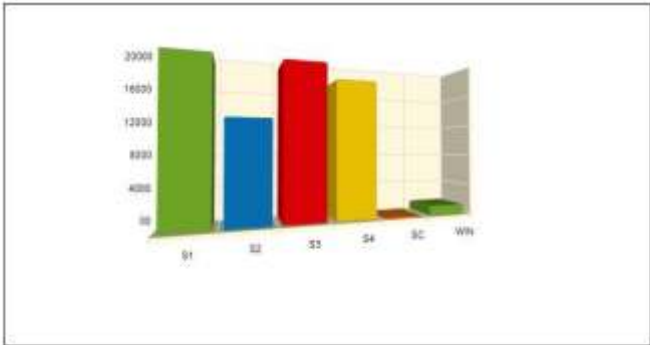

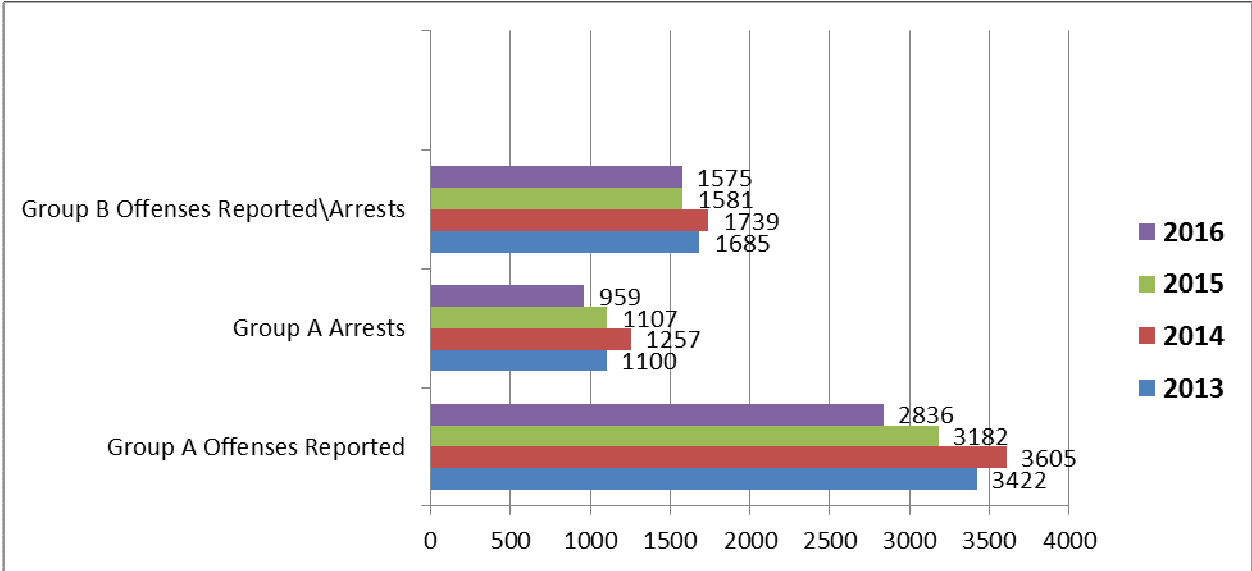

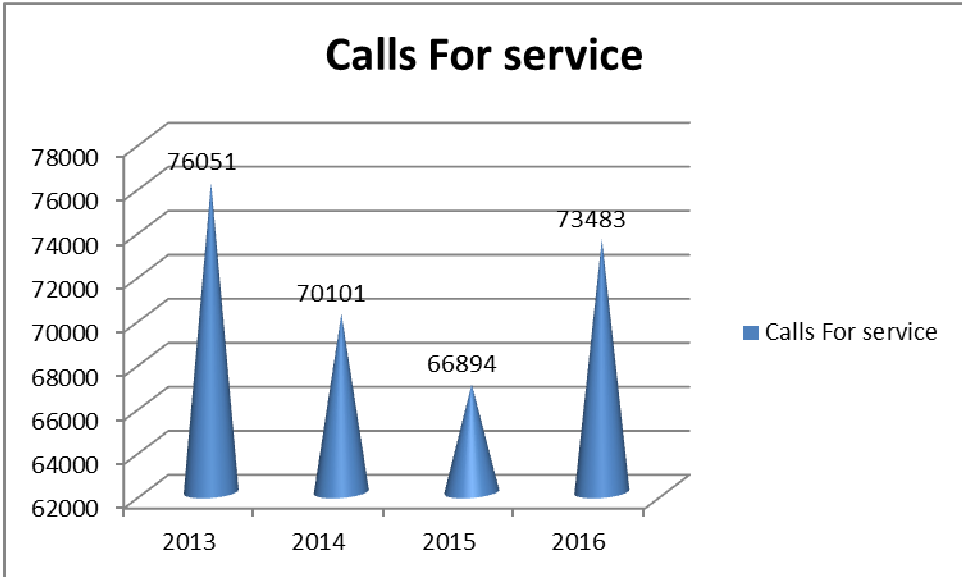
