Mark Gleason made a motion to approve the Strategic Plan; Tamara Green seconded; the CPMT approved.

- Contract Renewal Letter
 - The FY20 Contract Letter Renewal was provided in the packet for CPMT's reference.
 - Vendor Contracts
 - The CSA Account Specialist provided a spreadsheet showing the percentage of rate increase for each vendor. The vendors who increased rates more than 3% were denoted in red.

- CPMT agreed to a temporary approval of all vendor rate sheets above the 3% threshold only for youth who are currently placed with or using providers who fall into this category.
- o CPMT requested further review of the over 3% vendors during the July 22nd meeting, as well as, review of any justifications for the increase vendors may have given.
- The CSA Coordinator attended the meeting that updated stakeholders about the rate study being completed at the request of the SEC. Information was provided about data collected, along with a preliminary assessment of that data. Meeting Takeaways:
 - o Approximately 1/3 of PDSs in the state participated in the voluntary study
 - § 22 counties, 7 cities
 - § 8 for profit, 30 non-profit, 1 unknown
 - Recommendation for State rate setting would be based on collection of operating and personnel costs for the daily rate only (not inclusive of additional therapies)
 - § Operating costs were \$47.55/day
 - § Personnel costs ranged from \$15.38-\$49.51/hour (based on 8 hour day) depending on job title
 - § Each PDS would charge a different rate based on the number and type of personnel they employed
 - Recommendations will be made to the SEC and if the above is approved, PDSs it
 is suspected that vendors would be required to submit their agency specific
 information in order to be an approved provider.
 - DOE has developed 10 data points, like what the public-school system is required to report, to begin collecting outcomes from PDSs in July.

New Business:

- Administrative Memo #19-04
 - OCS has been working on utilizing the data collected to provide CQI Tools to local CSAs. A new page on the state CSA website has been launched at: http://www.csa.virginia.gov/Resources/ContinuousQualityImprovement
 - Administrative Memo #19-05
 - Beginning July 8, 2019, localities can submit their request for their administrative funds. Frederick County will receive \$28,541, which is \$2807.00 more than FY19 funds provided. The FY20 amount is split as follows: State- \$16,130/ Local-\$12,411.
- Administrative Memo #19-06
 - The FY20 Pool Allocations have been determined. Frederick County will be receiving \$3,427,291 which represents an increase of \$374,269 over the prior year. The FY20 base allocation is split as follows: State- \$1,936,954/ Local-\$1,490,337. This amount includes non-mandated funds; however, the non-mandated amounts are not available until July.

• FY20 CPMT Chair

o Beginning July CPMT meeting, the Chairperson changes to the Health Department, with the Court Service Unit as Vice Chair.










Placement Environment

Intensive Care Coordination (ICC): Supervised Master's level staff, trained in the High Fidelity Wraparound Model, provide a minimum of 5-10 hours/week to the identified client/family. Provide a framework for the process of identifying, coordinating and evaluating the services a family deems necessary to meet their issues and outcome goals. Determination of Level of Care

- 1. Premier TFC offers non-treatment, treatment, and short-term foster care to children. Additional services include supervised visitation, reunification services, dependent infant care, and transportation services.
- 2. Premier provides the Family Assessment and Planning Team (FAPT) with the necessary documentation to substantiate the requested level of care.
- 3. Children admitted who have not been in treatment foster care previously shall be admitted at the Assessment Level which is designed to determine the strengths and needs of the child. The maximum length of time on this level is 60 days.
- 4. At the completion of the Assessment period, Premier shall submit a FAPT report outlining its findings and treatment recommendations, including the level of care.
- 5. Children accepted from a former foster home shall remain on their current level until the next scheduled FAPT meeting.

Assessment Level: Children recently placed in treatment foster care for whom a determination must be made on their strengths and service needs. This level shall not exceed 60 days. Daily fee: \$130/day

Non-Treatment Level: Children on this level is generally in good health, developmentally on target, and demonstrates age-appropriate behaviors for their age. Used for a sibling of a child who meets the criteria for treatment foster care. Case management once monthly and crisis intervention is available. **Daily fee: \$110/day**



Level I Mild: children on this level requires a low level of monitoring to lessen the probability of increased service needs or a return to previous level of social/emotional/behavioral/personal care needs. Child requires monitoring with face-to face case management visits twice monthly and 24 hours crisis Face-to-face case management. **Daily fee: \$130/day**

Level 2: Moderate: Moderate social/emotional/behavioral/personal care needs that requires increased case management services to meet the child's needs. Child may present with school performance issues, oppositional behaviors, school issues, occasional physical aggression and moderate level of medical needs. **Daily fee: \$145/day**

Level 3: Intensive: Child's social/emotional/behavioral/personal care needs are severe on this level and requires intensive intervention to prevent home disruption and residential placement. Areas of needs on this level may include but not limited to severe depression, anxiety, impulsivity, hyperactivity, anger control, adjustment to trauma, oppositional, eating disorder, physical health problems, developmental delay, or intellectually disabled. **Daily fee: \$150/day**

Specialized Level: Child's social/emotional/behavioral/personal needs are so severe they require five (5) or more visits monthly to stabilize youth and prevent transition to a higher level of care. Areas of need on this level includes but not limited to intensive case management, frequent school interaction, assistance with medical and psychiatric needs, etc. **Daily fee: \$160/day**

Short-Term Foster Care: This Level is designed for child who requires crisis or alternate planned-support relief for up to 29 consecutive calendar days to families in need of substitute care for youth placed in their home. Daily fee: \$130/day

Infant/Dependent Care: Services are for infant child of youth in foster care. Services include monitoring of infant during home visits with mother to ensure child is cared for properly including infant health and welfare, teen parent education, child specific resource referral, and 24-hour crisis support. An alternative level of care may be requested from FAPT if the infant requires specialized services.

Daily fee: \$27/hr.

Supervised Visitation: Supervision of visitation between client and visitors approved by the legal guardian. This includes written documentation of observations and feedback to legal guardian. **Hourly fee: \$65/hr.**



Reunification Services: Assist parent/legal guardian and child during the transition home for up to six (6) months after discharge to include all face-to-face solution-focused intervention.

Hourly fee: \$70/hr.

Transportation: Children requiring transportation more than thirty (30) miles one way for services. \$0.55 per mile.

PATH to Permanency Program Scope of Services

The Bair Foundation provides a diversified spectrum of services through the PATH to Permanency Program utilizing the evidence-based Nurturing Parents Program (NPP). Bair is a full service provider for children youth and families; therefore, continuity of care is built into the service array. As a Trauma Informed Service Provider, Bair recognizes that when children and families have fewer staff working with them in a concentrated manner, they are able to achieve expedited success. Not only does it reduce duplication of services and the need for multiple treatment plans, it also provides them with seamless access without needing to communicate with multiple service providers. Reduction in duplication along with a focus on time-limited services may come at an initial upfront cost, but ultimately creates a cost savings on the child delivery system. Creating healthy children and families for a permanent tomorrow is the desired outcome of the PATH to Permanency Program.

Every branch of a tree grows in different directions taking alternate *paths*, but the tree maintains the same roots. The PATH to Permanency Program assists children and families as their *path* develops into permanency for children. Helping families understand the ultimate goal is to prevent a disruption of a child's growth, but when that is not able to occur children need to maintain their roots while growing on another *path*. That *path* may be growing with a kinship family, growing with an adoptive family or possibly even growing out to be on their own through independent living and employment. For these children, Bair's older youth initiative strives to *Foster Futures* of young people who are in need of forever connections with trusting adults and the skills necessary to achieve success. Regardless of the *path*, Bair is here to help the child and family as they work through these stages of growth in permanency. Therefore, the Bair Foundation developed the PATH to Permanency Program to help children and families as they journey to permanency.

The PATH to Permanency Program is built on the following core principles:

- All families have strengths.
- All families need and deserve support; the degree and type of support varies throughout life.
- Successful families are not dependent on long-term public support, but maintain healthy interdependence on extended family, friends, spiritual and cultural organizations, schools, and other natural environments.
- Families and Service Workers are equally important partners in the process, contributing valuable knowledge to meet mutual service planning goals.
- The Services Worker's role includes empowering the family to set achievable goals, providing access to services needed to achieve goals, and offering guidance and encouragement throughout the process.



The PATH to Permanency Program provides the following service areas:

- **Prevention Family Services**** (36820) Services for biological families when no out-of-home episode is occurring.
- Life Skills Training/Job Coaching** (29186) Services to teach teens ages 17-21 skills to transition to adulthood and skills to attain and maintain employment.
- **Reunification Services***** (34735) Case management and support services for families as they work towards reunification with their children who are placed in out-of-home settings.
- Adoptive Home Study***** (36821) Utilizes the S.A.F.E. home assessment process to ensure families are safe and enhance overall wellbeing as appropriate forever resources for children through adoption or guardianship.
- Adoptive Home Visits*** (36822) Provides pre- and post-adoptive visits in the home of resource families to ensure that all safety and wellbeing measures are met prior to final determinations of adoption.
- **Guided Visitation***** (37203) Services provided during an out-of-home episode of children as they visit with their biological families. This service provides safety and supervision of the visit while the worker prompts and guides the family in best practices of parenting skills.
- **Parent Support/Prevention Services***** (28264) Service assists parents with the skills needed for family stabilization, appropriate discipline, transportation, budgeting, and life skills.
- Transportation***** (36037) .55 per mile in accordance with federal reimbursement + \$10/hr.
- Pre-Placement Foster Family Visits* (34736) Resource family visits child at the child's location.
- **Pre-Placement Employee Facilitated**** (37205) Bair employee coaches and facilitates visitation between the child and the identified perspective resource parent.
- Overnight Pre-Placement Visitation**** (37009) Resource family hosts the child in their home for overnight pre-placement/matching visitation.
- Mentoring Services/Basic******* (37261) Mentoring to assist youth transitioning out of RTC or needing additional wrap around services to maintain or preserve their placement. This service is provided for children and families in need of guidance and support who do not have mental complexities. This service provides client directed coaching, skill building, training or recreation in order to reduce and eliminate negative behaviors and increase positive pro-social coping skills.
- Mentoring Services/Intensified** (37262) Mentoring to assist youth transitioning out of RTC or needing additional wrap around services to maintain or preserve their placement. The intensified mentoring services are for children and families with mental health complexities. This service provides client directed coaching, skill building, training or recreation in order to reduce and eliminate negative behaviors and increase positive pro-social coping skills.

Assessment Level

This is a new service that is required by the Office of Comprehensive Services for "Standardizing Levels of Therapeutic Foster Care." The Assessment Level is provided to all youth at entry to YFT's TFC Program. The assessment treatment level will not exceed 60 days and is used to assess the youth's strengths and needs and provide treatment foster care services.

Services Include: Treatment Foster Care Case Management and Assessment activities. During the assessment, the youth will be assigned an YFT Family Specialist, who will be responsible for gathering the needed information to assess the youth's treatment and service needs. All youth are assessed by YFT's consultant psychiatrist, unless the guardian requests that an outside psychiatrist be used. An Initial Planning Meeting is conducted either prior to placement or in the first week, to organize the treatment team and start the assessment process. Treatment Foster Care Case Management Services: Develop and monitor individualized treatment goals for each client, coordinate services with others involved in the treatment plan and provide referrals to appropriate resources for services and treatment.

During the intake process or in the first week of placement (in emergency placement situations) a comprehensive interview is conducted which assesses the youth in a variety of domains. Initial Plan of Care is developed with short term goals to be used until the Master Treatment Plan is developed. A Foster Home Contract and Safety Plan (as needed) are completed with each youth and their foster family. YFT completes a Bio/Psycho/Social Assessment during the first 30 days of service. This document is a comprehensive assessment of the youth and his/her family's strengths and needs and includes recommended goals for the Master Treatment Plan. YFT will use this document to create a shorter Assessment Summary and Recommendation for Level of Care for the Family Assessment and Plan Team (FAPT) to use in determining the youth's TFC level of care.

Treatment Foster Care - Level 3

These services are based on "Standardized Levels of Care for Therapeutic Foster Care" as defined by the Office of Comprehensive Services. Level 3 Services are provided to youth who demonstrate a significant level of social/emotional/behavioral/medical/personal care needs of impairment of normal of age and development; such as but not limited to, depression, anxiety, impulsivity, hyperactivity, anger control, adjustment to trauma, oppositional, substance use, eating disorder, physical health condition, developmental delay, or intellectual. The child's needs are of such acuity or severity that they require intensive action (interventions, services, supports, etc.) be taken to address, remedy or ameliorate the needs. A child served at this level may be at risk of residential placement.

General Information for Children's Services Act (CSA) Teams Regarding Updates to Virginia Department of Social Services (VDSS) Foster Care Policy Effective July 1, 2019

Updated VDSS Foster Care Manual

Although still in draft form, VDSS has released its updated Foster Care Manual effective July 1, 2019. Of interest to Children's Services Act teams is that clarity has been provided by the Federal liaison regarding the time frame for those foster youth who are placed in group homes or residential treatment centers at the time of the youth's 18th birthday.

For youth who are full-time students expected to complete secondary schooling or equivalent training before reaching 19 while placed in a group home or residential placement, funding may continue until the last day of the month the child completes or graduates from school.

For youth turning 18 while placed in a group home or residential placement and who are not expected to complete secondary schooling or equivalent training before reaching 19, funding may continue until the last day of the month that the youth turned 18. (Section 14.4.3)

This extension of funding until the end of the month applies to youth who are funded by CSA as well as those funded by Title IV-E. The youth may then be enrolled in Fostering Futures.

Statutory Changes

The 2019 General Assembly enacted several pieces of legislation affecting the policies and practices of the Virginia Department of Social Services (VDSS) and its local departments. Although many of the requirements do not affect implementation of the Children's Services Act or only indirectly affect CSA, this summary provides information which may be of interest to or affect your local CSA teams.

Child Trafficking

HB 2597 and SB 1661 amended the Code of Virginia to include specific requirements regarding human child trafficking. Local departments of social services (LDSS) are now required to respond to all complaints or reports involving child human trafficking. The law establishes that the alleged victim's parent, caretaker or *any other person suspected of trafficking a child* may meet the caretaker criteria needed to determine the validity of a child protective services complaint or report involving the alleged human trafficking of a child. The local DSS must complete a trafficking assessment and the law permits DSS to assume emergency custody of child victims for up to 72 hours during this assessment without approval from the child's parent or guardian.

Of importance to CSA is that these children will meet the criteria as eligible and mandated for CSA while in the custody of the local DSS, just like any other child in DSS custody in an approved placement. If the local department cannot resolve the situation within the 72 hours of the emergency custody hold, it is required to petition the court for continuation of custody and placement.

Family First Prevention Services Act (FFPSA)

HB 2014, SB167 and SB 1679 addressed changes to the Code of Virginia needed as a result of the implementation of the federal FFPSA, including definitions and requirements, in particular those for residential treatment programs. Of note is that there will no longer be exclusions for background checks for <u>any</u> employees, service providers or volunteers in residential programs. The background checks must be completed prior to beginning employment.

Foster Care-General

Implementation of SB 1135 requires LDSS to notify the Community Services Board as soon as it is known that a child in foster care has a developmental disability so that the CSB can screen and place the eligible child on a waiver waitlist.

HB 2758 and SB 1720 require the local DSS to determine if a child has relatives who may be eligible as kinship foster parents and to provide notice and information to those relatives regarding the possibilities of Kinship Guardianship or foster parenting.

Implementation of HB 1883 prohibits insurers from refusing or failing to renew automobile insurance solely on the basis of the insured being a foster parent or a youth in foster care.

Local DSS are now required to place a security freeze on the credit report of any child under the age of 16 who has been in foster care for six months or more. The removal of the freeze is required when the child discharges from foster care, at the age of 16 if the foster youth requests the removal, or if the LDSS determines that removal of the freeze is in the child's best interest. The LDSS continues to be responsible for conducting annual credit checks for foster youth between 14 and 18 years old.

Foster Care Omnibus Bill (SB 1339)

SB 1339 implements many of the recommendations found in the 2018 Joint Legislative and Audit Review Commission's (JLARC) report on foster care. These new requirements include:

- Creating additional foster care and adoption oversight staff positions in Regional Offices
- Submitting to VDSS the names of all foster parents licensed in their locality and updating the list quarterly
- Granting authority to the Commissioner of VDSS to place, remove or direct the placement or removal of a child in foster care when a foster home or facility fails to meet federal or state requirements related to the child's health, safety or well-being
- Granting authority to the Commissioner to intervene when a local agency fails to provide foster
 care services or acts in a manner which poses a substantial risk to health, safety and well-being
 of any child, including the assumption of temporary control of the local department's foster care
 services and associated funds
- Establishing and maintain a complaint system, including a statewide hotline and electronic means of submitting complaints regarding local departments
- Establishing a foster care caseload standard

Background of the CSA Service Gap Survey

- One primary responsibility of the Community Policy and Management Team (CPMT) is to coordinate long range, community-wide planning to develop resources and services needed by children and families in the community (§2.2-5206).
- The 2006 Virginia General Assembly amended the Code of Virginia to further specify this requirement. On an annual basis, the CPMT shall report to the Office of Children's Services (OCS) on gaps and barriers in services needed to keep children in the local community (§2.2-5211.1.2).
- This report marks the 12th year that data has been collected by OCS on service gaps, barriers to filling these gaps, and local efforts to overcome the barriers.



Methodology

- Emails sent to CPMT Chairs and CSA Coordinators with link to automated Survey Monkey survey on March 6, 2019
- Survey closed on May 10, 2019
- One submission permitted per locality (some localities filed jointly under one CPMT)
- 114 response out of 126 possible 90% response rate
- Utilized VDSS regions to group localities



Gaps Grouped by Type of Service: Statewide












Regional Boundaries















































Conclusions

- Community-based Behavioral Services group selected most often statewide and a top 3 gap in every region
 - Trauma focused/informed Services was selected most often statewide and in 3 of the 5 regions
 - Youth with Multiple Mental Health Diagnoses were identified as the population most often statewide and in the top 3 in all but the Eastern Region
 - High School Age children were selected most often statewide and in every region



Conclusions (continued)

- Foster Care Services group selected second most often statewide and a top 3 gap in every region
 - Family Foster Care Homes selected most often statewide and in every region
 - Youth with Multiple Mental Health Diagnoses were identified as the population most often statewide and in the top 3 in every region
 - High School Age children were selected most often statewide and in every region



Conclusions (continued)

- Family Support Services group identified third most often statewide, but in the top 3 in only the Eastern (2nd) and Piedmont (1st) regions
- Other Service groups selected in the top 3 included Educational (3rd) in the Central Region, Crisis Services (3rd) in the Northern Region, and Residential Services (3rd) in the Western Region

- Barriers Weighted by Ranking in Order from Highest to Lowest
 - Provider Availability
 - Lack of Transportation
 - Lack of Funding
 - Need for Collaboration and Consensus
 - Need More information and Data
- Almost 84% of localities initiated actions over the past year to address these perceived barriers
