Call to Order: Peter Roussos called the meeting to order at 1:01pm.

Adoption of May Agenda: Dr. Colin Greene made a motion to adopt the May agenda; Mark Gleason seconded; CPMT approved.

Consent Agenda: The following items were put in the Consent Agenda for CPMT's approval:

- April 27th CPMT Minutes
- Budget Request Forms Confidential Under HIPAA

Adoption of April Minutes: Dr. Colin Greene made a motion to approve the April minutes as distributed with non-substantial changes; Michele Sandy seconded; the CPMT approved.

Committee Member Announcements:

• Dr. Greene gave the team and update about Frederick County's COVID-19 cases. Our area has 215 positive cases. He encouraged cloth face coverings and social distancing to help maintain our gains and continue towards progress.

• Per Dana Bowman Crossroads has decided to close their Page County clinic and will continue to use the telehealth services through other offices.

New Business:

In the interest of time and to better accommodate community member participation and discussion, CPMT moved the Emergency Funding Policy item under New Business toward the beginning of the meeting.

- Public Comment- Emergency Funding Policy Review:
 - CPMT meeting public attendees expressed concern over the ability for youth who do
 not have an open case with CSA to access funding in an expedited manner.
 - Michele Sandy summarized the matter brought to her attention by staff of FCPS
 regarding the process for youth who are not approved and unable to access CSA
 funding. Without providing any specific client information, FCPS staff referenced a
 recent Parental Referral which resulted in unsatisfactory recommendations. Discussion
 centered on the ability for non-CSA youth to access funding in an expedited manner
 and to ensure that caregivers are better informed about the process through telephonic
 contact.
 - Ben Thompson, FCPS staff voiced his concern about the discharge and/or transition process for youth awaiting FAPT review. He also advocated for expedited funding for this population.
 - The CSA Coordinator detailed minimum requirements to access emergency funding for this population of youth, including FAPT determined eligibility, IFSP inclusion, Parental Agreement Meeting, and funding approval.
 - CPMT recommended forming a subcommittee to review concerns and suggest policy changes if any are needed.

Adoption to Convene to Closed Session: On motion duly made by Mark Gleason and seconded by Jay Tibbs, the CPMT voted unanimously to go into Closed Executive Session to discuss cases confidential by law as permitted by Section §2.2-3711 (A) (4) and (15) and in accordance with the provisions of 2.2-5210 of the Code of Virginia.

CSA Report: Fiscal Year 2020 Pool Reimbursement: net expenditures were \$ 2,582,491.84 with a local match of \$ 1,041,127.91. In May \$235,917.83 was spent. Of the 132-youth served to date, 19 have been served in congregate care and 13 in a TFC.

Non-mandated Budget: The CSA Coordinator summarized the non-mandated budget for FY20 stating that \$0.00 is encumbered with \$28,457.42 being spent. In May \$0.00 was spent.

Special Education Wrap Budget: Frederick County was initially allocated \$16,442.00, with additional allocations of \$45,631.63, \$89,743.45, and \$55,555.56 in SpEd wrap funds. To date, \$122,329.25 has been used and an additional \$63,386.00 is encumbered.

Office Updates:

- Updates
 - High Fidelity WrapAround SOC Expansion Grant
 - § Totals for high fidelity wrap, 7 current open cases in Frederick County and 4 in Winchester. One case in Frederick county will begin on June 1st 11 are open and 8 are currently closed. 19 families have been served (same as last month)

Old Business:

- Strategic Plan Update- Goals
 - The CSA Coordinator reported being unable to move forward with completion of the remaining two strategic plan goals due to current circumstances.
 - Mark agreed that due to COVID-19 restrictions it would be difficult to have effective coordination and recommended suspending work on the strategic plan goals until the relevant pandemic restrictions are lifted.

New Business:

- Private Day School Rates during COVID-19:
 - Attempts were made to negotiate PDS rates with Grafton. Grafton administrators
 offered rates at 50% through April 10, then revert to the full daily rate thereafter. CSA
 argued that instruction being received by day school students during the COVID-19
 closure is less demanding and rigorous than in person instruction, and students do not
 receive the same quantity of instruction each day.

After submitting several offers which were not accepted by Grafton and receiving pressure from Grafton to discharge private day students, the CSA Coordinator consulted the CPMT Chair and FC Director of Special Instructional Services for direction. A conference call with Grafton administrators was planned to include the CPMT Chair, Director of Special Instructional Services, and CSA Coordinator. Frederick County agreed to Grafton's initial offer, but clarified that between March

16, 2020 through March 20, 2020, no payment would be made due to being unable to provide equitable access to instruction for Frederick County Special Education students.

As a part of the discussion, the Frederick County Chair also added concern regarding a tone of aggression perceived in Grafton's communication style and the way Frederick County was compelled to agree to pay the PDS daily rate.

- Parent & Private Provider CPMT Representative Appointments:
 - Both the Parent and Private Provider CPMT Representative positions are appointed by the Board of Supervisors to serve on CPMT for two years. These appointments are made biannually in even years by providing letters of recommendation to the BOS.
 New appointments will begin July 1.
 - § The Parent Representative, Dawn Robbins has indicated her desire to continue in her role and offers her name for consideration. A motion was made by Mark Gleason and seconded by Michele Sandy to recommend Dawn Robbins continue her role as the Parent Representative on CPMT.
 - § The Private Provider Representative, Dana Bowman has indicated that she will no longer be able to serve in this position and will be stepping down at the end of the term. The CSA Coordinator will reach out to other local providers to get the position filled.

Adoption of Budget Request Forms: Mark Gleason made a motion to approve the Budget Request Forms; Michelle Sandy seconded; the CPMT approved. Private Provider and Parent Representatives abstain from voting on funding for youth receiving services provided by their respective agency or where there may appear to be a personal financial gain from the provision of services.

Review Assigned Tasks:

- The CSA Coordinator will provide CPMT details of the current process for youth with no agency involvement to access CSA funds.
- The CSA Coordinator will send out an email to local providers about the Private Provider vacancy and attempt to recruit a new Private Provider Rep
- The CSA Coordinator will letter to the Board of Supervisors to reappoint Dawn Robbins, current Parent Representative on CPMT.
- The CSA Coordinator will schedule a meeting for the subcommittee meeting for emergency funding and parental agreement policies

Next Meeting: The next CPMT meeting is Monday, June 22nd, 2020 at 1:00 p.m. in the First Floor Conference Room in the Frederick County Government Offices Administration Building.

Adjournment: Mark Gleason made a motion to adjourn; Jay Tibbs seconded; the CPMT approved. The meeting was adjourned at 2:21pm.

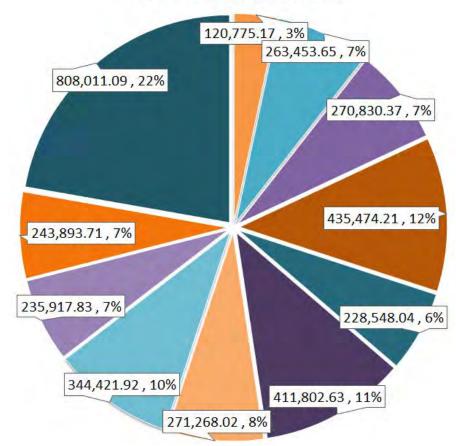

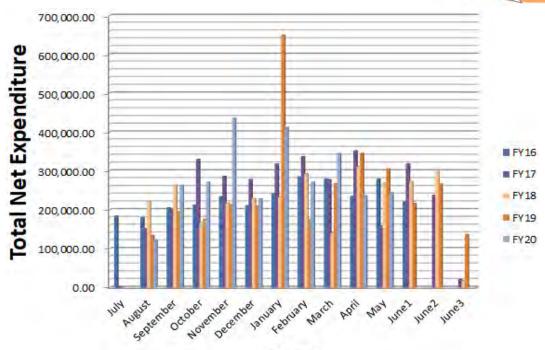

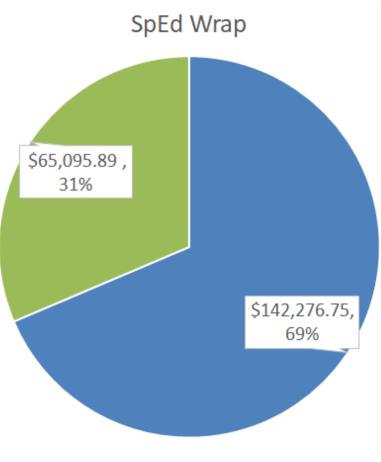

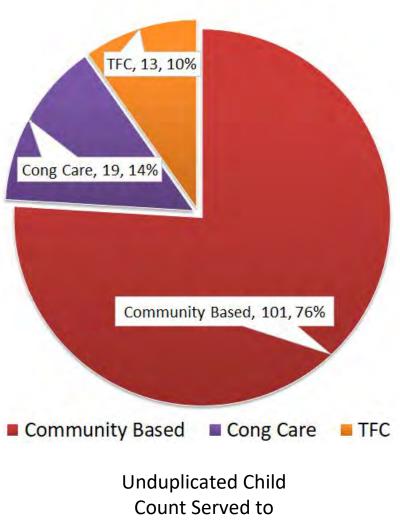

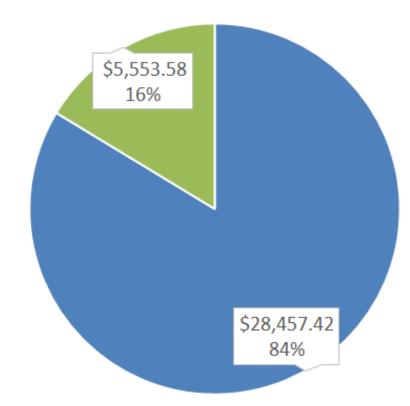

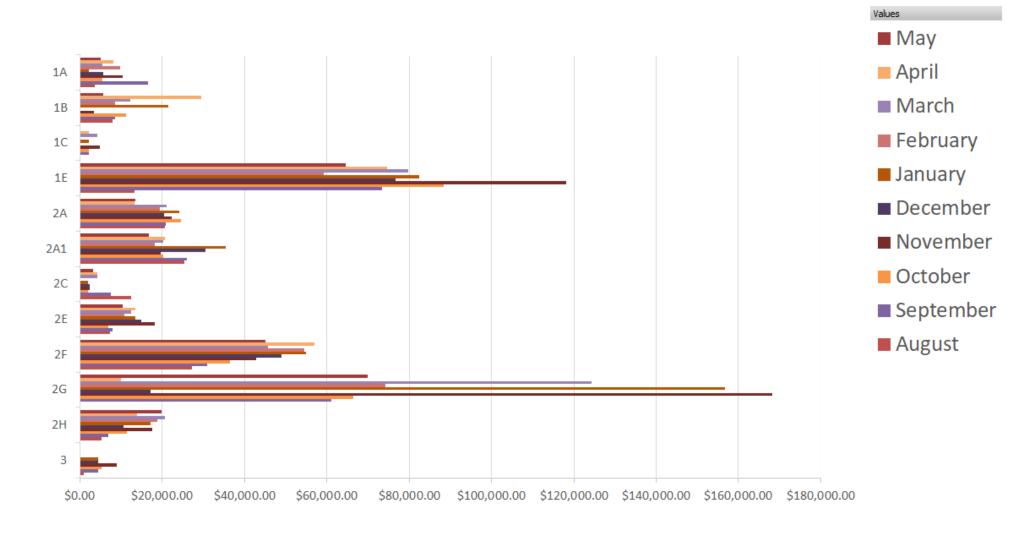

SYSTEMS OF CARE:

CHILD ASSESSMENT OF NEEDS AND STRENGTHS (CANS) GRANT WIDE SUMMARY

From May 1, 2017 - September 30, 2020, UMFS managed three Systems of Care expansion grants that focused on High Fidelity Wraparound across Virginia. Each of these grant sites, through a partnership with the case managers at the local level, completed and submitted CANS assessments. The following data is comprised of assessments from all three expansion centers in grant years one, two and three. The domains below were chosen as areas to highlight due to their alignment with the overall goals of High Fidelity Wraparound, an evidence-based program.

The percentages below indicate the percentage of overall improvement from initial to discharge assessment.

FY2020 Administrative Budget Plan:

Please review your Transaction History Report to confirm your locality has requested the funds. FY2020 Administrative Budget Plan fund requests must be approved by the Locality Fiscal Agent by June 15, 2020. As of June 1, there are a number of localities which have not yet completed their request for Administrative funds. The system will close on midnight June 15, 2020. At that point no other requests for the current FY2020 Administrative Funds will be accepted.

FY2021 Administrative Budget Plan Funding:

The process for localities to request their Local CSA Administrative funds in FY2021 will stay the same. The current process no longer requires a paper submission, physical signatures, or the mailing of the request to the Department of Education.

The procedure is electronic, done through the CSA LEDRS system. The CSA Coordinator originates the process; the CPMT Chair and the Fiscal Agent then sequentially approve it. Once initiated, an e-mail notification will occur at each stage alerting the appropriate individual of the need to take action, the individual needs to login to the CSA Local Government Reporting System to approve the request. After the local Fiscal Agent has approved and submitted the Administrative Budget Plan, OCS recommends that the locality print and retain a copy.

FY2021 Administrative Budget Plan fund requests must be processed between July 8, 2020 and June 15, 2021. The system will close on midnight June 15, 2021. At that point, no other requests for the FY2021 Administrative Funds will be accepted.

Attached to this memorandum is a table showing each locality's FY2021 CSA Administrative Budget Plan Allocation.

New Transaction History Report Showing Administrative History Information:

This report has been modified to display the Administrative Allocation Section. If there is a message stating that the "Locality has NOT filed the Administrative Plan for the current fiscal year, the CSA Coordinator needs to submit the Administrative Plan in the LEDRS system. The Administrative Plan needs to be filed and approved fully by the locality by June 15, 2020. The first column indicates the current status of the Administrative fund request. There will be a row visible if Administrative funds have been requested. The Administrative fund request has various approval stages, if the status is;

0 the CSA Coordinator has pended the Admin Plan Request;

1 the CSA Coordinator has submitted the Admin Plan Request;

3 the Locality CPMT Chair has approved the Admin Plan and

5 the Locality Fiscal Agent has approved it.

If the status is a 0, 1 or 3, then the locality needs to take action. If it is in status 5 everything at the local level has been completed waiting for DOE payment, at which time it will become a status 9.

FY2021 Expenditure Reporting

FY2020 Year-End Reimbursement Processing:

During the months of July, August and September, the CSA LEDRS System can accept expenditures incurred in multiple fiscal years. During the months of July and August, a locality can only submit one (1) LEDRS file each month. In the month of September, a locality can submit up to three (3) LEDRS files.

In the months of July, August, and September LEDRS separates the submitted expenditures into FY2020 and FY2021 based on the purchase order fiscal year, to determine the program service year and the month of service. The expenditure reimbursement data from the locality comes in a single submission. Therefore, a locality should review both FY2020 and FY2021 expenditure reimbursement requests before the Fiscal Agent approves the July, August, and September LEDRS submissions.

All FY2020 reimbursement requests, for CSA services incurred (between July 1, 2019 through June 30, 2020) must be approved by the local CSA fiscal agent in LEDRS before midnight September 30, 2020. Late submissions will not be accepted for reimbursement as addressed in State Executive Council (SEC) Policy 4.5.2. Waivers to the September 30 reporting requirement must be submitted in writing and will be considered only if local governments demonstrate mitigating circumstances beyond their control.

CSA FY2021 Base Pool Allocation and Protected (Non-Mandated) Funds:

Attached to this memorandum is a table which shows the FY2021 Base Pool Allocation by locality. The amount shown in the table will be the locality's Base Pool Allocation, which will be reflected in the CSA Transaction History Report. The table also reflects an estimated required local base match required to receive the state's allocation. Please carefully review the amount allocated to your locality.

The Protected (non-mandated) funds are a subset of the locality's Base Pool Allocation. The Protected funds are not additional funds. It is a portion of the Base Pool Allocation that your locality can use to provide services to non-sufficient (non-mandated) youth and families. Attached to this memo is a PDF file, which reflects the FY2021 Protected funds associated with a locality's Base Pool Allocation.

FY2021 Wraparound Services for Students with Disabilities Funds:

The FY2021 state appropriation allocation for "Wraparound Services for Students with Disabilities" (SPEDWRAP funds) is \$2,200,000. This specific appropriation represents a continuation of the CSA "earmark" funding for this particular service category.

This limited appropriation has several restrictions. The state share of reimbursement of this category of expenditures may not exceed \$2.2 million statewide, nor can the appropriation be used for or transferred to other service categories. As with all state appropriations, any unexpended allocation cannot be carried forward from one fiscal year to the next. The Office of Children's Services (OCS) must allocate and manage these funds in such a manner as to ensure compliance with these restrictions.

The use of the funds for "Wraparound Services for Students with Disabilities" allows localities to provide services to youth when their identified educational disabilities affect adjustment outside the school environment. Such services may provide critical support for youth who face significant challenges in the home or community. (Please see SEC Policy 4.1.3). Communities are encouraged to consider their local policies regarding the provision of Special Education Wraparound services and to identify strategies to maximize the utilization of community-based supports for all youth.

The allocation and management of the funds are based on the following principles.

- 1. All localities should have an opportunity to utilize the funds,
- 2. All localities should have access to the funds, and
- 3. 100% of the earmarked funds will be available for allocation.

The process for allocation and management of the FY2021 SPEDWRAP funds will be the same as in prior years.

- 1. The initial allocation to localities will be based on the locality's average utilization over the prior four years.
- If a locality does not receive SPEDWRAP funds in the initial allocation or if a locality needs additional SPEDWRAP funds, they can request funds by completing the SPEDWRAP Request Form, which is on the CSA website under Resources>Forms. Submit the form to the OCS Business and Finance Manager for funding consideration.
- 3. In January 2021, any locality that has not posted any SPEDWRAP expenditures to LEDRS, will risk having their allocation unallocated by OCS for reallocation to other localities that are requesting additional SPEDWRAP funds.

Requests for additional SPEDWRAP funds will be supported based on the availability of unallocated SPEDWRAP funds. The total state allocation cannot exceed \$2,200,000.

FY2021 Expenditure Reporting:

The LEDRS System will open for FY2021 program service year reporting (services from July 1, 2020 through June 30, 2021) on August 1, 2020. LEDRS will be the CSA expenditure system of record and shall be the mechanism to report and calculate the state's share of CSA reimbursement to localities.

It has been a pleasure working with you and your children and families. We are pleased to inform you that our rate increase remains modest for the upcoming fiscal year (approximately 2.7%-4%). Our kinship care rate increased by \$3.00 (4.5%); however, that service has not been utilized by your agency. We feel the modest increase in placement services is justified due to increased expenses in health insurance, professional liability insurance, cyber security insurance, foster parent and employee training. Additionally, new costs due to purchasing PPE and other supplies for protection of staff as well as computer tech support for working remotely due to COVID-19.

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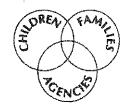

You have already received out FY 2020/2021 rates sheets for review.

In regard to our increase, our education programming is expanding to include the utilization of enhanced technology options for residents. Programming initiatives include the movement to provide 1:1 access with a technology device. Increased accessibility to online classroom learning platforms (e.g., Google classroom) to additional specialized learning opportunities. Additionally, on-going and sustained professional development in the area of trauma-informed care and developing trauma-sensitive learning environments from field experts is planned. Enhanced technology options will also provide access to virtual vocational programming to support graduation requirements around career education and transition, for both general and special education populations. Furthermore, physical renovation projects are scheduled that will support the development of sensory areas across the facility to support the needs of residents.

The increase in our Assessment & Diagnostic services is due to the fact our therapist is now providing individual behavioral support services, intensive integrated case management services and recreational therapy services.

We have also added a new fee for a single room when requested or when clinically required. This is because we only have double room occupancy in most of our rooms here and when we have to provide a single room, we cannot place a child on the other side of the double room.

2020-2021 Explanation of Rate Changes

TFC serves youth age 0 to 18 and up to 21 for fostering futures. HumanKind ensures excellence regarding recruitment, training, and foster parent support. TFC foster parents attend monthly face to face training provided by licensed clinical staff covering a variety of topics such as trauma informed care, professional parenting, foster care timeline, and understanding mental health diagnosis. Case workers also attend monthly face to face training to better oversee a youth's individualized treatment plan and to provide therapeutic services such as foster parent ongoing training in the home, crisis intervention, and case coordination.

HumanKind TFC has grown from our one Lynchburg location to currently serving 5 throughout the state of Virginia. We strive to employee well trained and experienced staff who carry lower case loads. Carrying lower cases loads allows case mangers to better support our foster parents and clients.

As we embark on our one hundred and sixty-fifth year serving children and families in the Commonwealth of Virginia, I would personally like to thank each and every one of you for your continued support and your partnership in the provision of care for adolescents experiencing mental illness and/or addiction. Our healthcare hero's continue to provide much needed services through this very difficult Pandemic. We would like to remind all of you that as the state transforms the behavioral healthcare system we are keeping instep to meet the guidelines before us to continue to serve children and families. Jackson-Feild Behavioral Health Services is a TRICARE provider, and has engaged in contracts with many private insurance providers.

The General Assembly approved a long overdue (12 years) per diem rate increase beginning July, 2020 for Psychiatric Residential Treatment Services. The Governor then put a *freeze* on all new spending due to the Pandemic. At some point, and we don't know when, the *freeze* will be lifted. Therefore, we have included as part of our contract a rate increase of approximately 10.5% for our psychiatric residential services when permissible. We have also increased our education rates by approximately *three percent* to meet the general cost of living. As a not-for-profit organization, we continue to provide your agency with opportunities to save on costs as we offer lodging and transportation for families as an incentive for family engagement. Jackson-Feild Behavioral Health Services is blessed to have donors fund budget relieving items and events that provide enrichment for our residents. While we have advanced clinical care as a Psychiatric Treatment Center, we like to continue to provide experiences for the residents that express our history *and/or ethos as a Children's Home*.

Dear Colleagues,

First let me express my sincere hope that you are all staying safe and healthy during this difficult time of isolation. The work you do is difficult even without the added complexity of social distancing and stay-at-home orders. Our communities are made better by your continued dedication to our most vulnerable populations. Thank you.

2019 was another exciting year in child welfare! People Places received over four hundred referrals for placement during the calendar year, and, in partnership with local Departments of Social Services and the Office of Children's Services, we were able to help match many of these clients with a "forever home". Of the 70 client discharges that occurred in 2019, 26 returned to the birth family or relative placement, 30 were adopted and 8 went to other TFC homes or more restrictive placements. In addition, our growing Family Support Services like Therapeutic Mentoring and Family Mentoring continue to score successes in prevention and reunification, serving 130 families and clients.

Over the past year, People Places has focused on Quality Improvement. We are implementing teams to analyze and improve internal processes, as well as being much more deliberate about seeking and responding to critical feedback from Social Workers, Teaching Parents and Clients.

Since People Places was founded in 1973 we have always tried to provide efficient and effective not-for-profit services to our communities. To that end, we did not increase rates for the 2019-2020 fiscal year. However, due to an anticipated 17.4% increase in cost of health insurance, as well as the anticipated long-term impacts from the COVID-19 pandemic, we have been forced to adjust several rates.

Staff to to student ration seldom higher than 1:3. Liaison maintained with public school and youth's family.

Private Day School: 1:1 Aide (ED - 38498) 1:1 Aides provide intensive supervision to maintain the student's placement as well as to help the student be able to meet classroom expectations both academically and behaviorally. The goal is to gradually increase the amount of time the student can work independently in the classroom. Data is kept by the Aide on the amount of time spent with the student.

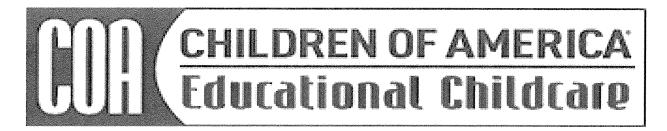
Therapeutic Mentoring (CS - 35715) Provision of one-to-one supervision to children or youth requiring more intensive individual guidance to successfully adjust in the foster home setting, school, or community, while supporting and reinforcing identified treatment goals.

Transportation (TR - 36396) Transportation to support attainment of the goals in a child's service plan, either through contracted services or payment of mileage. Services may be designed to enable a child or family member to attend counseling, parenting classes, court, visitation with family members, or other appointments.

Outpatient Service Individual Counseling (CT - 35716) Individual therapy provided or supervised by licensed counselors/therapists/psychologist, also including Trauma/Neglect and Attachment work.

Outpatient Services Family/Attachment Counseling (CT - 35717) Family therapy provided or supervised by licensed counselor/therapist/psychologist to include Attachment and relationship-focused psychotherapy for family members in which the adults with whom the child resides are present and active in the treatment. Therapy focuses on parent training with goals of emotional development and related repair, for children with complex trauma/neglect or with attachment disorganization.

Other (CT - 35719) A unique service that will ensure the safety and well-being of a child in an out of home placement, prevent disruption of the current placement, or enhance reunification efforts.

PATH to Permanency Program

Scope of Services

The Bair Foundation provides a diversified spectrum of services through the PATH to Permanency Program utilizing the evidence-based Nurturing Parents Program (NPP). Bair is a full service provider for children youth and families; therefore, continuity of care is built into the service array. As a Trauma Informed Service Provider, Bair recognizes that when children and families have fewer staff working with them in a concentrated manner, they are able to achieve expedited success. Not only does it reduce duplication of services and the need for multiple treatment plans, it also provides them with seamless access without needing to communicate with multiple service providers. Reduction in duplication along with a focus on time-limited services may come at an initial upfront cost, but ultimately creates a cost savings on the child delivery system. Creating healthy children and families for a permanent tomorrow is the desired outcome of the PATH to Permanency Program.

Every branch of a tree grows in different directions taking alternate *paths*, but the tree maintains the same roots. The PATH to Permanency Program assists children and families as their *path* develops into permanency for children. Helping families understand the ultimate goal is to prevent a disruption of a child's growth, but when that is not able to occur children need to maintain their roots while growing on another *path*. That *path* may be growing with a kinship family, growing with an adoptive family or possibly even growing out to be on their own through independent living and employment. For these children, Bair's older youth initiative strives to *Foster Futures* of young people who are in need of forever connections with trusting adults and the skills necessary to achieve success. Regardless of the *path*, Bair is here to help the child and family as they work through these stages of growth in permanency. Therefore, the Bair Foundation developed the PATH to Permanency Program to help children and families as they journey to permanency.

The PATH to Permanency Program is built on the following core principles:

- All families have strengths.
- All families need and deserve support; the degree and type of support varies throughout life.
- Successful families are not dependent on long-term public support, but maintain healthy interdependence on extended family, friends, spiritual and cultural organizations, schools, and other natural environments.
- Families and Service Workers are equally important partners in the process, contributing valuable knowledge to meet mutual service planning goals.
- The Services Worker's role includes empowering the family to set achievable goals, providing access to services needed to achieve goals, and offering guidance and encouragement throughout the process.



The PATH to Permanency Program provides the following service areas:

- **Prevention Family Services**** (36820) Services for biological families when no out-of-home episode is occurring.
- **Life Skills Training/Job Coaching**** (29186) Services to teach teens ages 17-21 skills to transition to adulthood and skills to attain and maintain employment.
- **Reunification Services***** (34735) Case management and support services for families as they work towards reunification with their children who are placed in out-of-home settings.
- Adoptive Home Study***** (36821) Utilizes the S.A.F.E. home assessment process to ensure families are safe and enhance overall wellbeing as appropriate forever resources for children through adoption or guardianship.
- Adoptive Home Visits*** (36822) Provides pre- and post-adoptive visits in the home of resource families to ensure that all safety and wellbeing measures are met prior to final determinations of adoption.
- **Guided Visitation***** (37203) Services provided during an out-of-home episode of children as they visit with their biological families. This service provides safety and supervision of the visit while the worker prompts and guides the family in best practices of parenting skills.
- **Parent Support/Prevention Services***** (28264) Service assists parents with the skills needed for family stabilization, appropriate discipline, transportation, budgeting, and life skills.
- **Transportation******* (36037) .55 per mile in accordance with federal reimbursement + \$10/hr.
- **Pre-Placement Foster Family Visits*** (34736) Resource family visits child at the child's location, in the community or in the resource family's home (not an overnight visit).
- **Pre-Placement Employee Facilitated**** (37205) Bair employee coaches and facilitates visitation between the child and the identified perspective resource parent.
- **Overnight Pre-Placement Visitation****** (37009) Resource family hosts the child in their home for overnight pre-placement/matching visitation.
- **Mentoring Services/Basic******** (37261) Mentoring to assist youth transitioning out of RTC or needing additional wrap around services to maintain or preserve their placement. This service is provided for children and families in need of guidance and support who do not have mental complexities. This service provides client directed coaching, skill building, training or recreation in order to reduce and eliminate negative behaviors and increase positive pro-social coping skills.
- Mentoring Services/Intensified** (37262) Mentoring to assist youth transitioning out of RTC or needing additional wrap around services to maintain or preserve their placement. The intensified mentoring services are for children and families with mental health complexities. This service provides client directed coaching, skill building, training or recreation in order to reduce and eliminate negative behaviors and increase positive pro-social coping skills.
