

Frederick County Sheriff's Office 2011-2012 Goals and Objectives

- Implement the Frederick County Sheriff's Office Forward Mobility Project to implement a secure VPN connection between the Sheriff's Office and mobile users. This will be accomplished through the purchase of a NetMotion Wireless Mobility XE software package and compatible server. This increased access will provide for more time in the patrol vehicle, and less time at the office. This will also allow for a safer environment for the Deputies due to their access to critical safety data while in their vehicle and in contact with the public. This software will also allow for necessary updates to be pushed through the NetMotion product without the user having to manually update in person with the information Technologies Section.
- Continue with implementation of the Southeast Propane Autogas Development Program. As of May 2012, five of the expected ten cars have been outfitted with the dual fuel tanks. The propane fueling station was installed on the department grounds in 2011.
- To reduce teen driving accidents, DUI's, and traffic infractions through education by implementing the "Virginia Rules Program". The School Resource Officers and the Frederick County Traffic Unit will teach these classes to high school students.
- Work in conjunction with Frederick County Fire & Rescue, and the local student service learning program to create FADD, **Frederick County Against Distracted Driving.** A local organization aiming to promote the harms of distracted driving. FADD desires to bring awareness regarding the dangers of texting and driving to those in our community and beyond.
- Enhance law enforcement and community relations through deputies performing civic duties such as child fingerprinting, Sheriff's Kids Camp, the D.A.R.E. Program, Neighborhood Watch meetings, and updating the Frederick County Sheriff's Office website.

- Maintain the Virginia Law Enforcement Accreditation standards set forth for review in 2012. This demonstrates that the Sheriff's Office is adhering to a high standard set forth by the Virginia Law Enforcement Accreditation Coalition.
- Continuation of training on minority cultures and issues by training the deputies in cultural diversity. Deputies attend classes that instruct on other cultures and provide them with skills to better assistance minority citizens.
- Increase crime prevention activities in the community. The Sheriff's Office believes one way of reducing crime is through education. This education provides the public with information and suggestion on home, business, and Internet security; as well as personal safety. Local cable channel 16 list safety tips, current criminal activity or frauds, as well as wanted people.
- Reduce consumable budget costs within our department by using the electronic transfer of data and memos, and by turning off all electrical equipment and lights whenever possible.
- Reduce traffic related deaths in Frederick County by increasing traffic enforcement efforts on the highways of Frederick County.

Frederick County Sheriff's Office gets grant for equipment

WINCHESTER -- The Frederick County Sheriff's Office may soon start calling some of its cruisers "green machines."

County officials learned last week that the Sheriff's Office had won a \$58,000 grant from the Southeast Propane Autogas Development Program. The money goes to install equipment in 10 vehicles that allows each to run on both gasoline and propane.

"I really do think it's a neat project," Sheriff Robert Williamson said Wednesday afternoon. "It's more efficient than gasoline, cheaper cost-wise than gasoline at present."

"I would like, eventually, to see the majority, if not all of our fleet dual-purpose vehicles so that when we're at least in the area where most of them stay, other than transports and training and stuff, that they could run propane fuel because it's less costly, it is more efficient and it's better for the environment," Williamson said. "And in these days and times, if we can get them done for free or at no cost to us, then certainly it's a benefit."

The program seeks to retrofit 221 vehicles in Virginia as part of a larger initiative spanning from Mississippi and Florida to Maryland, Turkel said. The sheriff's vehicles should be converted by the end of the year, according to Turkel. Williamson said the grant requires the conversion to take place by Dec. 31.

Conversion will displace 12 percent of the annual gasoline consumption, according to Turkel. The cost per mile is less for propane, he said.

Since propane is produced domestically, use of the fuel reduces dependence on foreign oil, Turkel and Williamson have said.

Williamson said he is somewhat familiar with the alternative fuel because his father operated a propane gas company for years and ran his vehicles on the fuel. Technology has changed, Williamson said. Propane also burns cleaner in an engine. Williamson said he has seen engines with 150,000 miles run on propane that appear new inside -- showing less deposits and wear.

"There are a lot of positives to it," the sheriff added. "There are some negatives to it: Lack of fueling stations is one of them ... taking up the space of the trunk is an issue for us."

"Those cars are basically those guys' offices," Williamson said. "We're gonna do it irregardless and we'll just have to adjust. It's like any other change."

The Sheriff's Office needs to install a propane-fueling station, according to Williamson, which he anticipates would be located in the secure area at the county's public safety building. The office once had a DARE vehicle that ran on natural gas, and he said he had a hard time finding mechanics to work on the car. The grant includes training for area mechanics provided they pay their own way to where sessions are held.

The grant requires completion of the conversion by Dec. 31, according to Williamson. Representatives with the program are expected to bring a vehicle to the Sheriff's Office headquarters this week and demonstrate the conversion process, Williamson said.

High Profile Case

Fugitive Spotted on Reality Show Appears in Court

Authorities say suspect in sex crime fled country to avoid trial 10 years ago

WINCHESTER -- A man authorities say fled the country to avoid trial on a sex crime charge pleaded guilty Tuesday for failing to appear in court 10 years ago.

William Edgar Dick II appeared in Frederick County Circuit Court with his attorney, public defender Timothy Coyne. Dick, 30, with a last known address of Polk City, Fla., pleaded guilty to the felony charge of failing to appear in the court Jan. 9, 2002. Retired Judge Benjamin Kendrick accepted the plea.

Kendrick set Dick's charge of forcible sodomy for a jury trial April 27. The judge delayed sentencing on the failure to appear charge until the same date. Commonwealth's Attorney Glenn Williamson did not object to continuing Dick's sentencing to the April date. Dick remains held at the Northwestern Regional Adult Detention Center.

Authorities accuse Dick of committing forcible sodomy against a male victim on June 10, 2000. A grand jury indicted Dick on the charge a year later, court records show. A judge scheduled his jury trial for Jan. 9, 2002, but Dick failed to appear. Authorities searched unsuccessfully for the defendant, who was declared a fugitive by the court.

Investigators with the Frederick County Sheriff's Office continued to look for clues into Dick's whereabouts and had hints he may have fled the country, possibly to Costa Rica.

In 2010 an investigator received a tip from a friend of the alleged victim in the sodomy case that the fugitive had appeared as a bartender in an episode of the MTV reality show, "The Hills," which the network filmed in Costa Rica. Further investigation confirmed Dick appeared in the episode under a different name, according to documents filed in U.S. District Court in Harrisonburg.

A federal judge in U.S. District Court in Harrisonburg on Oct. 25, 2010, issued a complaint and a warrant for Dick's arrest for unlawful flight to avoid prosecution. Costa Rican authorities handed Dick over to United States custody, although extradition policies and other hurdles had delayed the process for months. Dick returned to the U.S., and ultimately Frederick County, in August. A Frederick County Circuit Court grand jury indicted Dick on the charge of failing to appear in September

DEFINITIONS USED FOR STATISTIC COUNTS

Property Crimes

In the Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) Program, property crime includes the offenses of burglary, larceny-theft, motor vehicle theft, and arson. The object of the theft-type offenses is the taking of money or property, but there is no force or threat of force against the victims. The property crime category includes arson because the offense involves the destruction of property; however, arson victims may be subjected to force.

Sex offenses

Offenses against chastity, common decency, morals, and the like. Incest, indecent exposure, and statutory rape are included. Attempts, battery and child sex crimes are included.

Forcible rape

The carnal knowledge of a female forcibly and against her will. Rapes by force and attempts or assaults to rape, regardless of the age of the victim, are included. Statutory offenses (no force used—victim under age of consent) are excluded.

Violent Crimes

Violent crime is composed of four offenses: murder and nonnegligent manslaughter, forcible rape, robbery, and aggravated assault. According to the Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) Proram's definition, violent crimes involve force or threat of force.

Drug Abuse Violations

The violation of laws prohibiting the production, distribution, and/or use of certain controlled substances. The unlawful cultivation, manufacture, distribution, sale, purchase, use, possession, transportation, or importation of any controlled drug or narcotic substance. Arrests for violations of state and local laws, specifically those relating to the unlawful possession, sale, use, growing, manufacturing, and making of narcotic drugs. The following drug categories are specified: opium or cocaine and their derivatives (morphine, heroin, codeine); marijuana; synthetic narcotics?manufactured narcotics that can cause true addiction (demerol, methadone); and dangerous nonnarcotic drugs (barbiturates, benzedrine).

Driving under the influence Driving or operating a motor vehicle or common carrier while mentally or physically impaired as the result of consuming an alcoholic beverage or using a drug or narcotic.

Liquor laws The violation of state or local laws or ordinances prohibiting the manufacture, sale, purchase, transportation, possession, or use of alcoholic beverages, not including driving under the influence and drunkenness. Federal violations are excluded.

Drunkenness To drink alcoholic beverages to the extent that one's mental faculties and physical coordination are substantially impaired. Driving under the influence is excluded.

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




Busiest; Day of Week, Hour of Day, and Beat Territory
