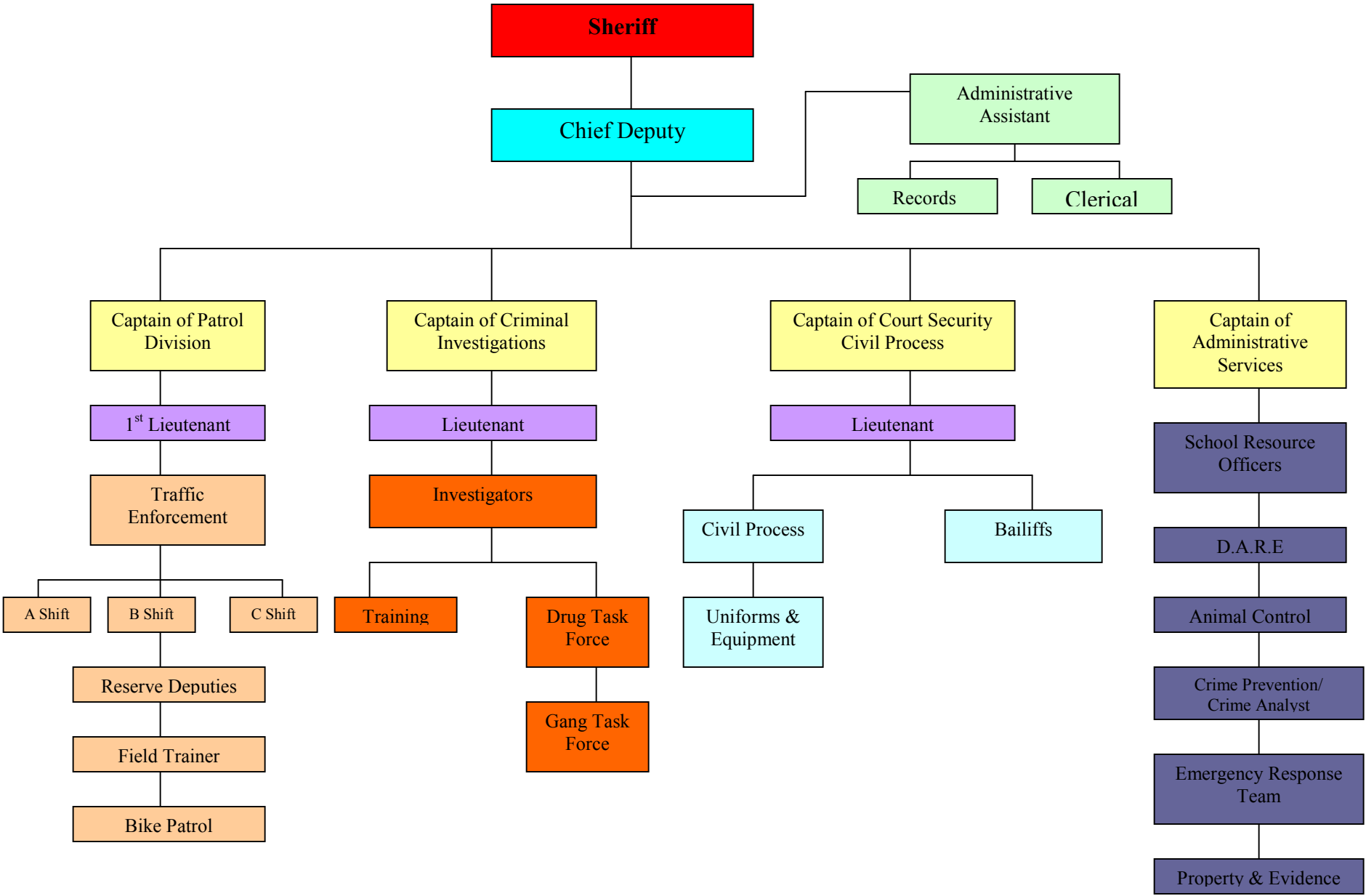

Code of Ethics

I will keep my private life unsullied as an example to all; maintain courageous calm in the face of danger, scorn or ridicule; develop self-restraint; and be constantly mindful of the welfare of others. Honest in thought and deed in both my personal and official life, I will be exemplary in obeying the law of the land and the regulations of my Office. Whatever I see or hear of a confidential nature that is confided to me in my official capacity will be kept ever secret, unless revelation is necessary in the performance of duty.

I will never act officiously or permit personal feelings, prejudice, animosities, or friendships to influence my decisions with no compromise for crime and with relentless prosecution of criminals. I will enforce the law courteously and appropriately without fear or favor, malice, or ill will, never employing unnecessary force or violence and never accepting gratuities.

I recognize the badge of my office as a symbol of public faith, and I accept it as a public trust, to be held so long as I am true to the ethics of public service. I will constantly strive to achieve these objectives and ideals, dedicating myself before God to my chosen profession-law enforcement.”

Frederick County. Other units of the Patrol Division are the K-9 deputies, the Traffic Enforcement Unit, and the Bicycle Patrol.

Criminal Investigation Division

The Criminal Investigation Division (CID) is responsible for investigating all major crimes that occur in Frederick County. Investigators in the Division may specialize in certain fields of investigation, i.e., property crimes, crimes against persons, etc. Investigators from this division also participate in regional task forces. These task forces include the Regional Drug Task Force, the Regional Gang Task Force, the FBI Violent Crimes Task Force, and the Internet Crimes Against Children (ICAC) Task Force. The Hostage Negotiation Team, the Underwater Search and Recovery Team, and Evidence and Property are also are part of the Criminal Investigation Division.

GOALS AND OBJECTIVES

To enhance the security of the citizens of Frederick County by providing effective, professional law enforcement services through community policing and provide a safe haven for all citizens to raise their families without fear and intimidation.

To enable the citizens to be more aware of what is happening in their neighborhoods and community by increasing education through crime prevention seminars, materials and programs thus allowing the community to be an integral partner in crime prevention and enhance crime solvency.

Strengthen the security in our schools by advancing student, teacher, and administrator relationships through the cooperative effort of our school resource and dare officers and educational programs. Teamwork will insure the safety and welfare of our future generations and prepare them to overcome the challenges of alcohol, drugs, bullying, and gang influences and peer pressures. Enhance the safety action programs for critical incidents through effective communication and training. And provide supplemental support for prospective new school resource officer needs.

Educate and implement programs and resources to handle the threat of gang influences in our community especially our youth.

Expand our traffic safety educational and enforcement programs to meet the ever-increasing demands in transportation issues. Provide our deputies with additional radar, in car cameras, spike strips, and accident investigation equipment to respond in an effective and efficient manner. Reduce the number of DUI accidents and fatalities by effective education and enforcement. Continue to work closely with VDOT to help survey and target problem intersections and roadways.

Purchase equipment for the Automated Fingerprint Identification System, "AFIS", which will provide for the same day identification of criminal suspects. Provide for a full time certified personnel in "AFIS" for courtroom testimony.

Continue to upgrade the equipment for deputies as well as provide additional training for personnel within the Sheriff's Office, which will provide for a safer work environment and prepare law enforcement officers to meet the increasing challenges of the 21st century. Provide additional revenue for educational incentives for career personnel.

Provide additional tools and resources to enhance the ability to conduct criminal investigations utilizing expanded forensic collection and processes.

To provide timely service of civil process and maintain the high level of courtroom security to ensure a safe environment for the efficient operation of our courts

Provide animal control services to ensure humane, appropriate treatment of animals and to protect the citizens from vicious or dangerous animals. Expand the training and education of our animal control officers to provide for updated and new certification requirements and techniques for the proper handling of all animals.

Maintain records, reports and information as required by the code of Virginia

Be responsive to citizen complaints and assist with the timely resolution of community conflicts

To provide the best service to citizens who have been victimized and provide the necessary evidence to prosecute suspects to the fullest extent of the law

Assist victims of crimes and provide appropriate guidance through the legal system making sure that they don't become mired and lost in the system. Be attentive to their needs at all times

Frederick County Sheriff's Office 2008 Activities

The year 2008 was a momentous year for the Frederick County Sheriff's Office. However, the highlight of the year for the Sheriff's Office was our accomplishment of achieving accreditation through the Virginia Law Enforcement Professional Standards Commission. The Sheriff's Office has been working on the accreditation process for several years. Becoming accredited reinforces Frederick County Sheriff's Office commitment to providing professional law enforcement service to the community. The following are some significant events/activities for the Frederick County Sheriff's Office in the year 2008.



Accreditation

On June 24 and 25, 2008 the Frederick County Sheriff's Office went through 2 days of assessment by the Virginia Law Enforcement Professional Standards Commission. The [Virginia Sheriffs' Association](#), the [Virginia Association of Chiefs of Police](#) and the [Virginia Department of Criminal Justice Services](#) (DCJS) make up the Virginia Law Enforcement Professional Standards Commission. VLEPSC executive board members consisting of active Sheriffs and Chiefs of Police establish professional standards and administer the accreditation process by which Virginia law enforcement agencies can be systematically measured, evaluated, and updated. DCJS manages the day-to-day operations for the Commission.

Three VLEPSC assessors came to the Sheriff's Office and went through file folders containing the 187 standards on Administration, Operations, Personnel, and Training. These 187 standards required us to comply with over 700 different elements of law enforcement. They inspected our building, rode along with deputies, and interviewed everyone they met. We were required to have two proofs of compliance in each folder for every one of the elements. We persevered and on July 17, 2008 we were awarded our accredited status. To maintain our accreditation status we have to place one proof of compliance in each folder every year and in 2012 we will be assessed again.





Recognition

Sheriff Williamson began his fifth term as Sheriff of Frederick County in 2008. In addition to this accomplishment Sheriff Williamson was awarded the Law Enforcement Officer of the year award by both the Winchester Exchange Club and the Stonewall District Ruritan Club. Finally, the Frederick County Sheriff's Office, Sheriff Williamson, Captain Beeman, and Secretary Cathy Longo were recognized for their outstanding support for the Transatlantic Programs Center of the United States Army Corps Of Engineers.

Weapons

The Frederick County Sheriff's Office purchased new MP-40 pistols for the entire department in 2008. The new weapons have increased the deputy's proficiency at the firing range and have a higher capacity magazine. All of the deputies were issued and trained with the new pistol during our spring firearms qualification.

Apple Blossom

The Frederick County Sheriff's Office provides law enforcement assistance to the Apple Blossom Festival every year. In 2008 the Sheriff's Office again provided security for visiting celebrities, dignitaries, and the festival queen and her court. The Sheriff's Office also handles an increase in calls for service during the Apple Blossom Festival.

Frederick County Fair

The Frederick County Sheriff's Office provides foot patrol for the Frederick County Fair the entire week of the fair. The Sheriff's Office presence at the fair provides a safe environment for everyone attending, so that everyone can have a good time. The fair also provides deputies from the Sheriff's Office and the public an opportunity to interact and develop positive relationships.

All Terrain Vehicles

In 2008 the Sheriff's Office purchased 2 ATVs and a trailer to transport them on to incidents. The ATVs will be used for search and rescues, special events, and directed patrols. Cpl. Ellinger attended a driver instructor school for the ATVs and is in process of training deputies to operate the ATVs.

Frederick County Sheriff's Office Youth Camp

The Frederick County Sheriff's Office sponsored the 10th Annual Frederick County Sheriff's Office Youth Camp at Camp Rock Enon in 2008. Personnel from the Sheriff's Office and sixty-eight 11-13 year old youths spent a week together having fun at Camp Rock Enon. The Frederick County Sheriff's Office Youth Camp is a 501 (c) non-profit organization that provides the weeklong camping experience to the children for free. Camp activities for the children include rock climbing, canoeing, swimming, fishing, nature walks, sporting events, and plenty of food.

Policy Review

The Sheriff's Office reviews the general orders for the department every four years. In 2008 all of the Sheriff's Office policies and procedures were reviewed and updated with new Virginia Code sections, new case laws, and other new information providing the deputies with up to date information and direction.

Field-Training Program

In addition to reviewing the general orders, the field-training manual was also reviewed and updated. Rookie deputies complete a 12-week field-training program after they complete the 18-week law enforcement academy. The field-training manual allows newly hired deputies to review and practice the skills they learned in the academy while being mentored by an experienced field-training deputy.

Community Presentations

In 2008 the Frederick County Sheriff's Office participated in over 50 community events. These events included child fingerprinting and safety presentations, Neighborhood Watch Meetings, National Night Out, Frauds against Senior Citizen presentations, and presentations to Boy and Girl Scout troops. The Sheriff's Office understands how important community involvement is and deputies are constantly seeking opportunities to build new relationships within the community.



Training

The Sheriff’s Office did an exceptional amount of training in 2008 in preparation for accreditation. All of the deputies received driver training with different types of vehicles, training in communicable diseases, and training in the newly enacted laws. All of the deputies in the Civil Division became certified with an Automatic External Defibrillator (AED) and in CPR. They all also attended the flying armed course, which allows them to fly armed on commercial aircraft while transporting prisoners.

The Frederick County Sheriff’s Office completely updated its departmental Internet website in 2008. The public now has access to numerous Sheriff’s Office resources, as well as information on Sheriff’s Office functions and activities.



Crisis Negotiation Team

The Frederick County Sheriff’s Office organized a Crisis Negotiation Team in 2008. The team consists of 10 Sheriff’s Office members who have all been trained as negotiators. The CNT conducts regular training sessions, and it also trains with the Emergency Response Team to enhance the Sheriff’s Offices response to crisis situations.

Bicycle Patrol

The Frederick County Sheriff’s Office has updated its Bicycle Patrol Unit. Four new patrol bicycles were purchased and several of the department’s current bicycles were refurbished with new equipment. Several deputies completed the weeklong bicycle patrol training at Rappahannock Criminal Justice Academy in Middletown. The Sheriff’s Office now has 9 certified bicycle patrol deputies.



Child Safety Seats

The Frederick County Sheriff's Office trained and certified five deputies to check child safety seats. These deputies are now performing child safety seat checks at community functions and at the Sheriff's Office.

LinX

The Frederick County Sheriff's Office became a member of the National Capital Region Law Enforcement Information Exchange (LinX). Obtaining membership in this organization will allow the Sheriff's Office to quickly obtain criminal justice information from all of the other member agencies. As of February of 2009, 89 law enforcement agencies from Maryland, District of Columbia, and Virginia are members.

National Incident Management System

All Sheriff's Office personnel have completed the required NIMS training for 2008. All deputies and civilian personnel have completed the ICS 700 and ICS 100 training, all supervisory personnel have completed the ICS 700, ICS 100, and ICS 200 training, and the command staff has completed the ICS 700, ICS 100, ICS 200, ICS 300, and the ICS 400 training. The Frederick County Sheriff's Office is in compliance with mandates from the Department of Homeland Security and the Commonwealth of Virginia. This training will allow Sheriff's Office personnel to better coordinate resources at catastrophic incidents.

DEFINITIONS USED FOR STATISTIC COUNTS

Property Crimes

In the Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) Program, property crime includes the offenses of burglary, larceny-theft, motor vehicle theft, and arson. The object of the theft-type offenses is the taking of money or property, but there is no force or threat of force against the victims. The property crime category includes arson because the offense involves the destruction of property; however, arson victims may be subjected to force.

Sex offenses

Offenses against chastity, common decency, morals, and the like. Incest, indecent exposure, and statutory rape are included. Attempts, battery and child sex crimes are included.

Forcible rape

The carnal knowledge of a female forcibly and against her will. Rapes by force and attempts or assaults to rape, regardless of the age of the victim, are included. Statutory offenses (no force used—victim under age of consent) are excluded.

Violent Crimes

Violent crime is composed of four offenses: murder and nonnegligent manslaughter, forcible rape, robbery, and aggravated assault. According to the Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) Program's definition, violent crimes involve force or threat of force.

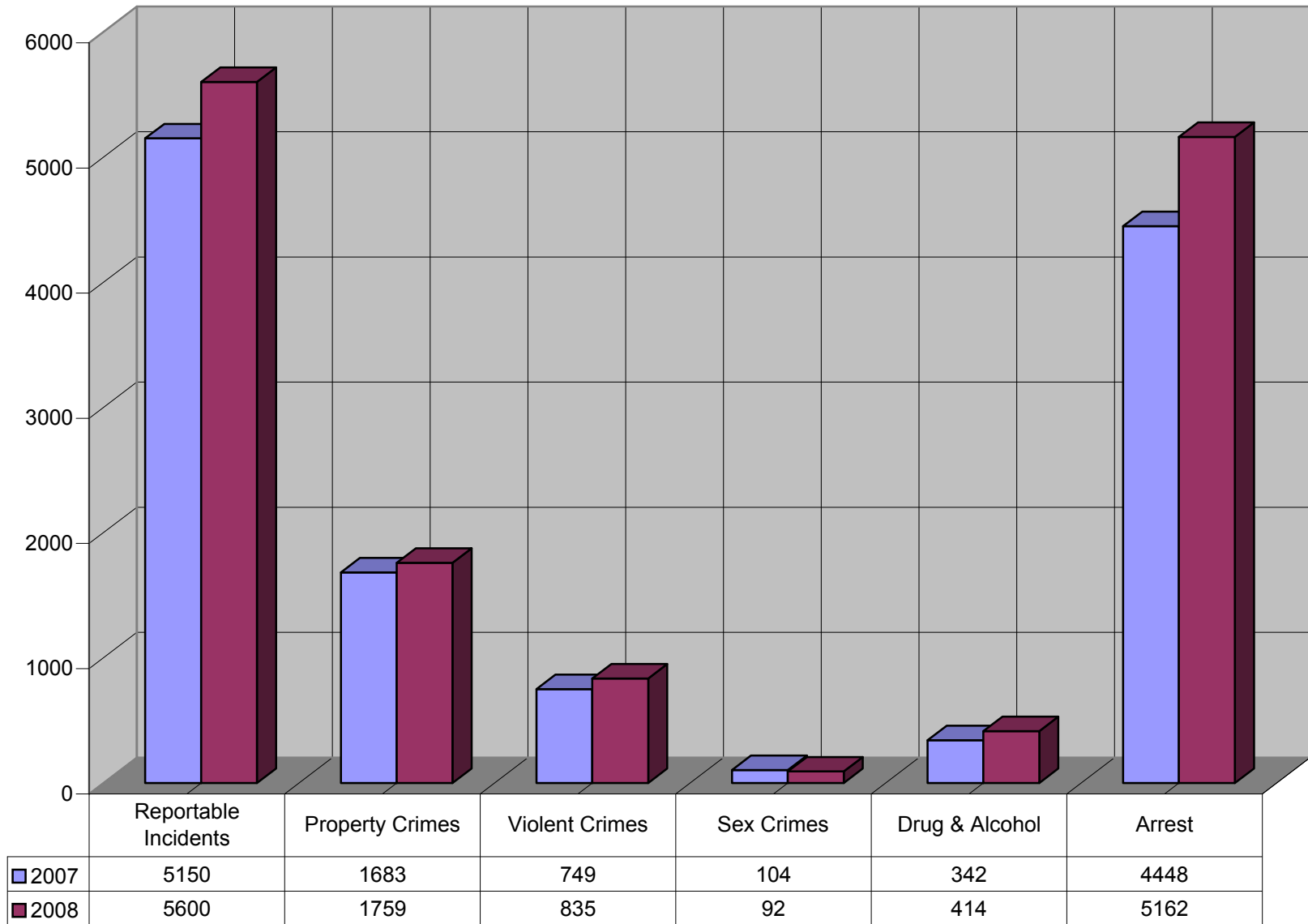
Drug Abuse Violations

The violation of laws prohibiting the production, distribution, and/or use of certain controlled substances. The unlawful cultivation, manufacture, distribution, sale, purchase, use, possession, transportation, or importation of any controlled drug or narcotic substance. Arrests for violations of state and local laws, specifically those relating to the unlawful possession, sale, use, growing, manufacturing, and making of narcotic drugs. The following drug categories are specified: opium or cocaine and their derivatives (morphine, heroin, codeine); marijuana; synthetic narcotics?manufactured narcotics that can cause true addiction (demerol, methadone); and dangerous nonnarcotic drugs (barbiturates, benzedrine).

Driving under the influence Driving or operating a motor vehicle or common carrier while mentally or physically impaired as the result of consuming an alcoholic beverage or using a drug or narcotic.

Liquor laws The violation of state or local laws or ordinances prohibiting the manufacture, sale, purchase, transportation, possession, or use of alcoholic beverages, not including driving under the influence and drunkenness. Federal violations are excluded.

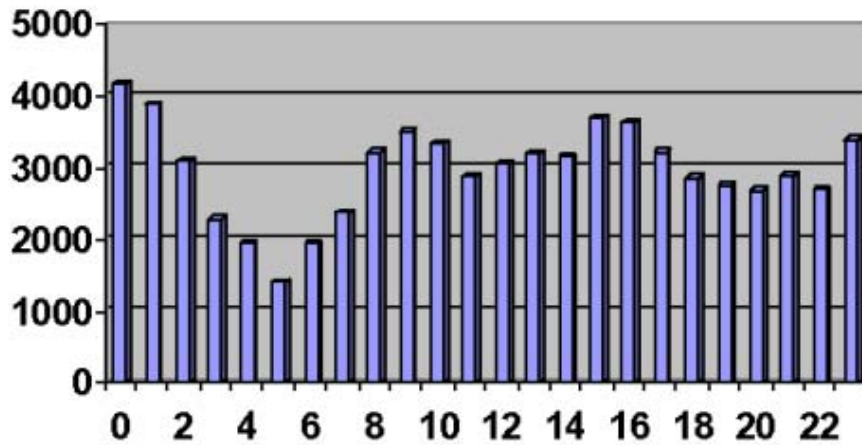
Drunkenness To drink alcoholic beverages to the extent that one's mental faculties and physical coordination are substantially impaired. Driving under the influence is excluded.



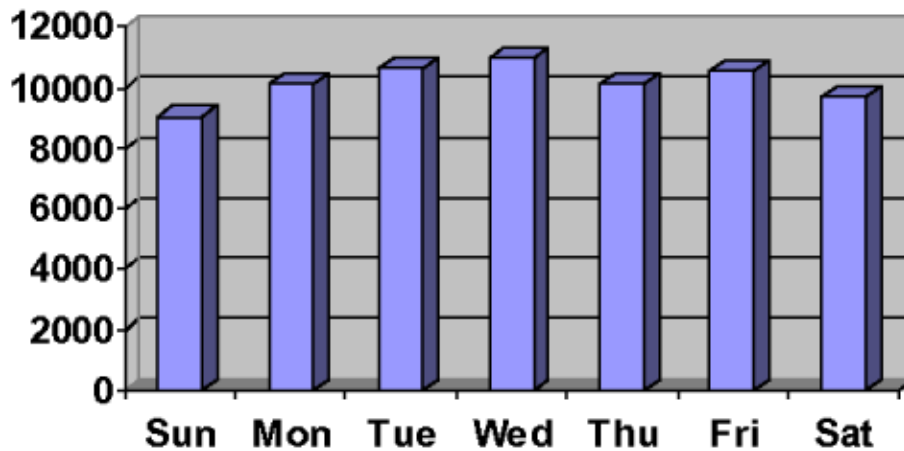
2007 2008
